In a Powerful Discourse He Showed The Need for Mormonism and Explained its Message.

dinary course of business. This revival found its way to the western part of the state of New York, where the family of Joseph Smith lived, powerfully affecting them. He also referred to the after results of strife and bitterness which followed the revival, which were noted by the boy Joseph Smith, who in his extremity was impressed by reading James 1: 5. "If any one lack wisdom let him ask of God," etc. He went into a grove near by and knelt in prayer, when after being almost overcome by a spirit of darkness, he afterwards saw the Father and Son, of whom he asked which of the churches was right and which he should join. The answer he received, that they were all wrong and were teaching for dictrine the commandments of men, might seem harsh, but if it were not true there could be no excuse for the introduction of Mormonism or the promulgation of its message. "The people living today are not wholly responsible for this condition," said the speaker. Many of the errors taught today have been handed down from other ages. We are willing to concede that many people in the world are doing the best they can, and are honest in heart. Virtue has not fled and not all professors of religion are corrupted. That some of the teachers have gone astray there can be no doubt, if one only considers the teaching of the awful doctrine of eternal 'punishment, By the statement of God as to the creeds of the day the rubbish of ages had been cleared away. God has done so in no unmistakable terms.

GROWTH OF MODERNISM. The speaker referred to the growth of modernism in the Roman Catholic church, which demands that the church come away from the symbols and creeds of the middle ages. The church is endeavoring to watch for and silence the assertions of those who say that it needs rejuvenating. After reading ex-cerpts regarding the condition of the Catholic church, the speaker asked why the rejuvenation of the Catholic church was demanded if it were no

He then adverted to the articles appearing in the Cosmopolitan magazine from the pen of Mr. Balsey, on the trend of University Education. It was asserted in them that the churches have set up a czar as God which has made man afraid and done uncalculable damage. It was stated also that the church was the last to come into the line of truth in modifications, and also that new recelation was needed and should come from the free and unfettered minds in the universities. The church was said to have murdered many victims, not for crimes, but for reading the Scriptures; and to have impeded the growth of the world, so that a new re-elation is now being formed and is needed.

Elder Roberts then proceeded to show that Mormonism met this need with its message of truth direct from God. "God has again spoken and renewed official relationship with the world. At the time when men had concluded that revelation had ceased and the canon of Scripture was full, God designed to speak again and reveal the record of American Scriptures, the Book of Mormon. God renewed revelation and gave a new dispensation of the Gospel and gave the Church authority to warn the world that the hour of God's judgment is come. And Mormonism is this reestablished church or it is nothing."

"God through his spirit permeates all elements. He is in the sun and moon and is the power by which they were created. He is also in man. The elements are eternal. MAN'S IMMORTALITY.

The immortality of man was then touched on and the speaker referred to the pre-existence of man as well as the life after death—an existence that ex-tends back of this life and reaches for-ward beyond it. The soul cannot be destroyed because it was not created, but will grow and develop in trait destroyed because it was not created, but will grow and develop in truth eternally. In conclusion the speaker addressed a few words to the G. A. R. veterans. "On the day when you, the members of the Grand Army shall march on our streets, not with elastic steps as of old, we shall watch you and contemplate you as living again when immortal youth shall be given when immortal youth shall be given you and you shall meet all your old comrades through the resurrection and there talk over your trials and sacrifices which you have endured to preserve the Union. We stand with you in this hope." We have a message of hope and en-couragement. With us this is the dawn-ing of a brighter day, and this life pressages something infinitely grander and better.

So Did a Boy's Thumb, With Other Serious Injuries.

The combination of a quantity of percussion caps carelessly left uncovered by thoughtless workmen, and their discovery by two lads with boyish curiosity covery by two lads with boyish curiosity to see how "big a noise" they could make, nearly resulted in a fatality yesterday, and did result in Peter and David, the 6 and 7-year-old sons of Peter R. Sneddon, being sériously injured. Peter, the younger boy, is confined in the Grove's L. D. S. hospital with the probability that he will lose an eye, and David has suffered the loss of the thumb and two fingers of his left hand.

The boys were playing yesterday afternoon in the quarry near the Grove's L. D. S. hospital, and not far from where the parents live on Thirteenth avenue. In playing among the rocks they had come upon the dynamite caps and promptly proceeded to see what they would do. Placing several of the explosives on a rock the lads, standing nearbly hurled another rock at them.

The force of the explosion threw both boys to the ground in a cloud of flying rocks and dust. David's two fingers and thumb were almost torn away, necessitating amputation, and the flying particles of rock struck the younger boy in the eye.


