THE ITALIAN SITUATION.

Rudini is Very Friendly Towards the United States.

New York, April 4.—The Mail and Express has a cable from Rome on the present situation. The Italian friend of the event, Count and Foreign Minister, obtained a statement from Rudini.

The Premier said he harbored none of the most friendly sentiments toward the United States. That would really be natural in the action which he called upon to take as the representative of the Italian people, who are really most unwilling with the French, after the position which Blaize was obliged to take in the matter, he had no intention of pushing any demands, and was ready to make a concession to the English, even if it were only to give up a protest against what he was led to believe at the time, was neglect on the part of the United States to do anything more than just leave him in peace, a grave error on his part, as he has given a clear and positive assurance of the United States.

Finally, he said: "I still now simply wait for further details of the new Italian government, and then I will let the Italian authorities and the United States government. But whatever may be, I am quite sure that the English will be satisfied to both parties will be for me, and that the friendship which binds the two nations will remain unshakable and secure."

DEFENDING CANADA.

Special Instructions from the English War Office.

OTTAWA, April 4.—A special from Ottawa, Ont.—Two important announcements confirm the previous statement that General Heriot, the new Canadian minister, sought special instructions from the English war office to specially strengthen the defenses of Canada and prepare for the possibility of another war with the United States. The first is a request to the government which has the care of a committee to advise the next appropriation of \$100,000,000, which can be thoroughly drilled in June. Next before us is the number of men required 200,000 men.

On Heriot's arrival in Halifax to confer with General Hall, commander of the imperial troops in Canada, with respect to the defense of the country, he found that Major Hall, who has a new fort will be constructed. One thirty-two gun gun recently arrived at Halifax from England, and the others about to be shipped. These are the last to be put on this side of the Atlantic and to greatly to the defense of Halifax.

AMERICAN POWERS.

Negotiations Between Philips and experts.

BERLIN, April 4.—Negotiations have been resumed between United States Commissioner Clinton F. Phillips and the experts on the question of the withdrawal of the prohibition against American pork products, and there are now some signs of an early and successful issue than recent reports had the public to believe.

THE RUSSIAN WAR.

France Does Not Believe the Russians Any More.

PARIS, April 5.—President Carnot will not visit the Moscow exhibition, although he received a formal invitation. A high percentage of the French public is in favor of the Czar, and the government has decided to postpone the taking of any step that might appear to confirm the current alarming rumors, and it is for this reason that the president decided not to visit the exhibition.

At the foreign office no credit is given to the reports circulated in London and Paris that the Czar has issued an order to his army to march on Moscow.

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
