W. H. WATTIS TELLS OF BIG CONTRACT.

General Manager of the Utah Construction Company Returns From New York.

GETTING OUTFITS ALL READY.

Confirms the Statement That Work Will Commence at This End of The Line.

(Special to the "News.") Ogden, Utah, Sept. 5.—W. H. Wattis, general manager for the Utah Construction company, returned yesterday afternoon from New York, very much pleased with the success he had achieved in securing for his company the immense contract for the construction of the greater portion of the Western Pacific line between Salt Lake City and California.

The immensity of the contract has not been exaggerated, states Mr. Wattis. There is no question but it is the largest contract ever awarded a construction company in this western country. Concerning the terms of the contract, Mr. Wattis stated that his company is taking the preparatory steps in getting their men and outfits ready to begin work just as quickly as the engineers decide where they are to commence making the grade, and the making of the road bed will be pushed with every possible haste.

Mr. Wattis states that there were many bidders in New York, endeavoring to secure the work, many of whom remained until after the contract was awarded the Ogden corporation, and congratulated Mr. Wattis on his success. The departure of Utah men for eastern colleges is beginning in earnest. Lloyd W. Brooke, Royal Martinez, and Frank Miller, the first two graduates of the high school class of '05, and the last from the Collegiate institute, leave tonight to enter Harvard.

TURNED OVER TO O. S. L.

Nevada & California Feeder of the Southern Pacific Changes Hands. San Francisco, Sept. 5.—Gen. Supt. W. C. Palmer of the Southern Pacific leaves for Nevada today to turn over the Nevada and California line to the Oregon Short Line people for operation hereafter. W. H. Bancroft of Salt Lake is the general manager of the Oregon Short Line, and he also operates the Nevada and California line. The Nevada and California is the new name of the Carson & Colorado branch line and the Hazen cut-off just completed. Hazen is east of Reno, and the branch line running from there toward Tonopah naturally falls into Bancroft's jurisdiction.
