DEATH OF THOMAS FOWLER. An Intrepid and Faithful Public Of-

ficer - Unique Ball. Special Correspondence.

Lehi, Utah Co., Feb. 15 .- Mr. Thomas Fowler of this place passed from this life early yesterday morning after about one month's illness. The cause of his death is due to a complication of diseases brought on by a general break-

Mr. Fowler was born May 28th, 1830, at Poughton, Worcestershire, England. He joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in 1854, and emigrated to Utah in 1858, and married Miss Jane Kimish, He was a member of the first handcart company that crossed Soon after his marriage he settled in Fort Herriman and remained at this place during the grasshopper war, and at the time of the move took up his abode at Salem. Utah. After remaining in Salem for a while he re-moved to Lehi during the latter part of the year 1862, which place has been his home more or less ever since. He participated in the Indian war of 1866, and in 1875 was elected city marshal of Lehi city, which position he held un-til 1889. He was county sheriff of Utah county for three years, selectman one term, and has held the position of depu-United States marshal and foreman of the Utah penitentiary. In the early days of Lehi he took a very active part in all public affairs, having belonged to the first organization of a brass band and was a member of the first home dramatic company.

He was a member of a number of expeditions in search of desperados and worked side by side with John Turner of Provo for a number of years in a de-tective capacity. Mr. Fowier was a man who did not know what fear was, and has been recognized for years as one of the best detective marshals of

He was the father of twelve children.
