A Saturday dispatch from Chicago says: The intercollegiate conference track and field meet on Marsh field today not only turned out a brilliant victory for Chicago, but set some new records for conference events and added several fect to the world's best previous discus throw, Chicago had 56 points, Michigan 3s and Iowa and Purdue were tied for third place with 71-3 points.

Lightbody of Chicago was the star of the occasion. He won the one mile event easily, incidentally lowering the conference record from 4:31-25 to 4:25. Then, without apparent effort, he chipped 1.25 seconds from the half-mile record, making it in 1:37.2-5. In the two-mile there was a sensation. F. A. Rowe, holly and closely pursued by his schoolmate, Stone, and by Lyon of Chicago, won out in 9:50. This time is 12-5 seconds faster than the previous record, made by Kellogg of Michigan two years ago, is, C. Glover of Purdue and R. V. Norris of Illinois tacked three-eights of an inch on to Dvorak's record-breaking performance in the pole vault, clearing the bar at it feet 9% inches, J. C. Garrels of Michigan, busides doing yeoman duty on the track, threw the discus 140 feet 2% inches, beating the previous world's record of Licago, the New York A. C. Captain Friend of Chicago,

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


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
