ENTRIES ALL IN.

There Are 210 Fine Men Bowling Teams Ready for Tournament.

Ready for fournament. Milwaukee, Wis, Feb. 13.-Secretary A. F. Lantry of the local organization hav-ing charge of the American Bowling con-gress, which wil Ihold forth at the Ex-position building in Milwaukee Feb. 20 to 35, inclusive, announced today that all the entries have been received. There are 210 five-men teams and the two-men teams number 420, and there are over 300 individual entries. The entries are said to be more than 100 per cent greater than for any previous congress. Between 2,000 and 3,000 bowlers are ex-pected to attend the tournament.
