A GOOD MAN DEAD.

Isaac James Caldwell, an Old and Respected Resident of Tooele, Dies in this City.

This morning the remains of Isaac James Caldwell, who died at his residence, 50 Central street, on Tuesday afternoon last, were forwarded to Tooele, his old home, for interment. The deceased was born in Eastern Canada, April 20th, 1816. He came to the United States in 1840, and to Tooele in 1850, where he died three years. He then moved to Rush Valley, Tooele County, where he married Miss Eliza Russell, with whom he raised a large and respectable family. In 1860 he removed to Tooele, where he resided until a few months ago when he brought his family to this city, where better facilities for educating his children were afforded. He was well and widely known throughout Utah. He served two terms as a member of the territorial council of Tooele city and held the last named office at the time of his death.

He was a man of a fearless and outspoken character, and his opinions and honest official work in which his constituents had the most implicit trust. He was affable kind and generous to a fault. In his youthful days he took part in the Mormon War, and was a dental physician in Utah. He was one of the seven presidents of the Forty-third quorum of Seventies. His death was due to a chronic indigestion, and though naturally he was a man of splendid physique and constitution his sufferings were intense and

more. His name was searched and there others, of the same species were found. He will probably have a hearing in the police court tomorrow.
