**CANAL COMPANY ANSWERS.** The answer of the East Jordan Irrigation company to the solit brought against if by the city has been filed in the district court. The action was brought to condemn a right to take water through the East Jordan canal. The canal company denies that the city owns 184 second feet of water from the Utah lake or Jordan river, and that the city, to carry out certain contracts, must supply water at a higher level through the Salt Lake City canal, and insists that all contracts for exchange of Jordan water for mountain water can be supplied through the city canal. The answer denies that a new channel must be provided to convey the water of Utah lake upon a higher level or that any of the city's lake water is needed for use above the present level. The company further urges that the condemnation would not be for the benefit of the public.
