FILES WANTED.

District Judges Issue an Order for Their Return.

From the orders entered on the blot. ters of their respective courts yesterday, it is evidently the intention of the judges of the Third district court to be more strict in the future in their regulations in the matter of allowing attorneys to take the papers in the various cases on file out of the clerk's office. Under the rules of the court the attorneys are allowed to take out the files and keep them for 30 days, upon signing for them in the receipt book kept for that purpose by the clerk. A great many of the files have been

misplaced by the attorneys and some of them never have been returned to the court. It is estimated that there are now some 2,000 files in cases absent m the clerk's office, and which have an kept out more than 20 days. Judge Hall yesterday ordered that attorney having any files in their possession must return them into court forthwith, Judge Morse made a similar order in regard to the criminal files. Following is the order made by Judge Hall;

"It having been made to appear that some 2,000 files of the court in that many actions which have been tried. and some of which have not been tried, have been withdrawn from the possession of the clerk by divers members of the bar, which said files, by the rules of the court, attorneys were permitted to withhold for 30 days; and it having also made to appear that the same files have been withdrawn from the clerk of the court by the rious members of the bar and withheld y them or some other persons through consent or negligence for more than 30 days;

"It is therefore ordered that such attorneys, having at any time rawn any of the aforesaid files, be and hey are hereby directed and required to forthwith return such files so with drawn and withheld by them respecly to the clerk of the court." idge Morse's order is as follows:

It is hereby ordered that all attornevs who have files, withdrawn from clerk's office and withheld for 30 days or more, are hereby directed to return such files at once. 'It is further ordered that no files in

criminal cases be taken from the court or clerk's office except upon the order of the court."
