OUR NEICHBORS. mmmmmmmm EAGER, ARIZONA. DEATH OF LORENZO BROWN. A Veteran of Kirtland and Pioneer Of Utah.

Special Correspondence.

Eager, Ariz., Jan. 29 .- Death visited our town last night and carried off one of our veterans, Lorenzo Brown, He was born at Pamforth, Chautauqua He was born at Panforth, Chattandan county, New York, Feb. 2, 1822; was the son of Benjamin and Sarah sion-ford Brown. His parents received the Gospel at an early day, and the Prophet found refuge with them when forced to fiee before a mob. The family gathered up to Kirtland, where Loren-zo received the Gospel, being haptized Dec. 1, 1938, He was with the Saints in their drivings and persecutions in Missouri and Illinois, and arrived in Salt Lake City in 1848, locating in the Seventh ward, at the corner of what is now Main and Sixth South streets. There he lived until called to the Dixle mission. In 1856 he filled a mission to Los Veges, leaving his family in disressed circumstances to meet the call of duty. In 1863 he was called with his family to settle in southern Utah and located in St. George, He filled a mislocated in St. George, He filled a mis-sion to Great Britain from 1875 to 1877; as a worker in St. George Temple for even years. He came to Arizona in net., 1883, and located at Nutrioso, where he resided until 1839, whe nhe came to Eager. BIG SHIPMENT OF MUSTANGS

Forty-One Carloads of Wild Horses In One Shipment.

Milford, Feb. 1 .- The biggest shipment of horses ever sent out of Utah went forward from Milford last Monday night. It consisted of forty-one

carloads, with an average of thirty-two horses to the car, making a total of 1,312 head. These horses brought \$5 and \$6 apiece, aggregating over \$7,000, making a total of \$9,000 worth shipped out of Beaver county this season. These

out of Beaver county this season. These horses were purchased by F. C. Erwin and L. M. Delaney, representing Thuet Brothers of Sloux City, and will be sold at auction at that place. Many differ-ent owners were represented in the deal, as every man in this section who had horses or the represented in the deal. horses on the range gathered up all that he could find. There were about 500 head from Minersville, over 200 from Wah Wah, and 150 from Beaver own-ers and they were gathered all the way from Escelante to Pine Grove valley. B. B. from Wah Wah being guite fat. There were some handsome steeds in the lot and a good team could have been pur-chased for about \$15. Very little atten-tion has been paid to range breeding during recent years, but some of these horses show the mixture of good blood the native stock.

The stock pens presented a lively appearance while the horsese were being loaded Monday, but beyond a few warm words over the ownership of certain animals, no trouble occurred.
