

FOREIGN NOTES.

A writer in the *Jewish Chronicle* calculates that in the year 1880 the nation of Israel is to be restored to Palestine.

The young French Countess de Montfort gave birth to a son in her carriage, the other day, while returning from a drive in the Bois de Boulogne.

When Miss Bruce, daughter of the British Home Secretary, was married the other day, she was attended by ten bridesmaids, of which nine were her sisters.

Archer Shee, a leading English Roman Catholic, and Queen's counsel, writes to the *Times* to say he utterly disbelieves in the so-called apparition of the Virgin Mary at Lourdes.

Thirty-five Hebrew families who have fled from persecution in Wallachia have been taken under the care of the United States Consul at Vienna. Subscriptions are being raised to assist them in emigrating to the United States.

The *Jewish Chronicle* says: A society of Atheists has been formed in Venice. They recently sent an address of congratulation to King Victor Emmanuel on the escape of his son and daughter-in-law from assassination. Oddly enough, forgetting they were Atheists, they "thanked Divine Providence for the miraculous escape," etc.

The latest clerical "vert" from the Church of England to the Church of Rome—these "versions" occur upon an average of one each week—is the Rev. E. T. Smith, vicar of Canwick, who has addressed a letter to his parishioners stating that "finding the Church of England was fast running into infidelity, heresy, and error," he had resolved to enter the Roman Catholic Church.

The death is announced of Charles Hallowell Carew, a noted British sportsman. He formerly possessed an immense fortune, and his life was insured for £300,000. He was once Lord of the Manor of Walton, and the Derby was run over a part of his estate. The last horse which ran in his name was Delight. The animal, the owner and the jockey—Kenyon by name—are all dead now.

Mr. W. H. Park, an English publisher, purposes issuing this month the first part of an "Index Expurgatorius Anglicanus," or a descriptive catalogue of all the principal books printed and published in England, which have been suppressed or burned by the common hangman, or censured, or for which the authors, printers or publishers have been prosecuted.

There was no exaggeration in the remark made by a London magistrate the other day "that there seemed at present to be a mania among women for committing suicide." Every day there are a number of cases of attempted or successful suicides in that city. On a single day not long since there were six such attempts, of which three were successful.

From the English mortality returns for 1870, which have just been published, it appears that during the year the deaths of 18 men and of 63 women, whose ages were stated to be upwards of 100 years, were registered; in all, 81 persons, against 63 and 79 respectively in 1869. The highest ages said to have been attained in 1870 were 108, by a man who died at Stone, in Staffordshire, and 107, by a woman who died at Huddersfield.

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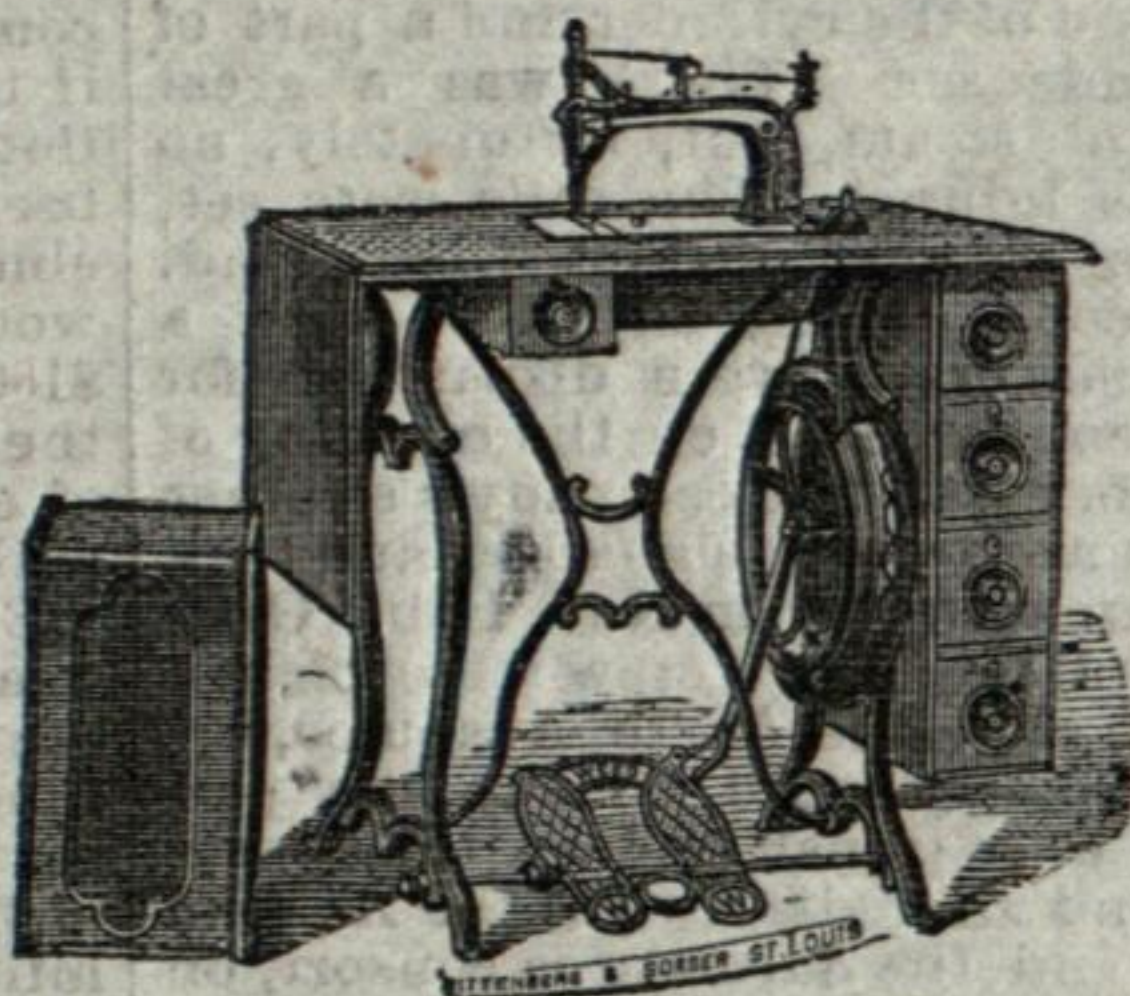
