LOCAL BRIEFS.

Evangelist Mackey Returns—Evangelist Mackey of the Volunteers has returned from Reno, where he reports having met marked success. He is again preaching in Commercial street.

May Visit Nevada—A. S. Highman, now out on parole from the state prison, has been given permission by the board of pardons to go into Nevada for 60 days to attend to mining interests.

Sheep Are Inspected—Chief F. E. Murray of the Bureau of Animal Industry and State Veterinarian A. C. Young are at Heber looking over sheep. Dr. Young failed to find any diseased sheep among 40,000 head at Vashatch recently.

Granite Mine Election—The student body of the Granite High school held the first meeting yesterday of this year and elected officers. Percy White was chosen president and Miss Lund, vice-president. Steve Love was elected treasurer. The school decided to publish a monthly paper.

Dividend Is Declared—The Deseret Savings bank directors met yesterday, and declared a 2 per cent regular dividend, and a 3 per cent special dividend, making 5 per cent in all, \$10,000, payable immediately. The Deseret National bank directors met, but transacted only routine business.

Raise Registry Fee—With the view of reducing the loss in the postal department, the fee for registration will be increased from 5 to 10 cents on and after Nov. 1. In the Salt Lake office during the year ending June 30, 94,547 pieces of registered mail matter were handled, and the increase of 5 cents will result in a gain for the office of about \$1,300.

To Discuss Sterrett Case—A meeting of the executive committee of the forty-third national G. A. R. encampment will probably be called early next week at which the resolution dealing with Director Frank M. Sterrett's criticism of the committee, which was introduced at the last meeting, will be further discussed, with such other matters as may come before the meeting.

Vast Sum For Coal Lands—With the payment of \$5,000 into the local land office by John F. Williams of Salt Lake City, yesterday afternoon, for 120 acres in Carbon and Carbon county, the total receipts for the month reached the unprecedented total of \$194,259. All of this sum representing the purchase of coal land in Carbon and Carbon counties.

Opened to Settlement—The lands of the recently abandoned military reservation in Rush valley, near Stockton, Nevada, have been opened for settlement. This reservation includes 5,661.10 acres, of which 12,742 acres have been patented to homesteaders, and 245.50 are included in grants for school purposes. The remainder may be entered upon under the provisions of the act of Aug. 23, 1894, at prices ranging from \$2.50 to \$5.00 per acre.

Pres. Kingsbury to Speak—President J. T. Kingsbury of the University of Utah, accompanied by his daughter Miss Edith, will leave for New York Saturday, where Miss Kingsbury will take up her studies in music. From there President Kingsbury will go to Boston in time to be present at the national association of state universities, which convenes in that city Oct. 4 and 5. President Kingsbury will deliver an address before the convention on "Proper Organization of Scientific Work of State Universities."

STATE BANK AFFAIRS UP FOR DISCUSSION

Secretary of State Tingey Returns From Chicago Convention—Savings Bank Practice.

Charles S. Tingey, secretary of state, returned yesterday afternoon from Chicago, where he attended the National Association of State Bank Supervisors. Among the subjects discussed in this convention was the proposed enactment by Congress of a postal savings bank law. The convention also took up the question of segregating savings deposits from commercial accounts, the guaranteeing of bank deposits and the maintenance of branch banks.

"The convention went on record," Mr. Tingey said, "as being opposed to the establishment of branch banks. In many states I learned that there was a law against it. A resolution was also adopted by the convention condemning the practice of savings banks in allowing excessive interest on savings deposits. It was shown that the margin between the interest allowed and the interest received on loans in savings banks was unwise. The borrowing of money by banks was also condemned and in many states laws have been passed against it.

"The most important matter taken up by the convention, I believe, was the segregating of savings deposits from commercial accounts. It was declared that the savings deposits ought to be kept separate and apart from the commercial accounts and the money ought to be invested separately and accounted for separately. The banks ought not to be allowed to meet demands upon them by using the savings fund."

Mr. Tingey also visited the Coliseum where the Land and Irrigation exposition is to be held. He declares that a first class exhibit from this state would be beneficial in many respects. There will be many beautiful sights presented. There will be a 40-foot waterfall in one part of the hall. A small irrigated farm will also be operated and there are many other scenic features.
