Inspector Hrynos Says He Knows Who the Inhuman New York Assassin Is.

MOLTEK'S LAST WORK BEFORE HIS DEATH.

President Harrison and Party Brought An Enthusiastic Welcome in San Francisco.

THE NEW YORK MURDER.

The Attorney Dismisses a Heavily Pled Case.

New York, April 25.—The deputy coroner continues his autopsy of the body of the woman murdered by "Jack the Ripper," this afternoon. The only fact of importance was the discovery that the mutilations were evidently made while the woman still lived, and it is expected that the discovery of the rotten, putrid state of the body will fully complete the work of the coroner. Inspector Hrynos made a statement to the reporter in the afternoon that the woman had been in custody before she was murdered, and that he had seen her in the custody of a man named "Freedy," or Francis Agoston, who was arrested last night.

GENERAL MOLTEK.

Details of His Death.—Estimated by All.

Berlin, April 25.—Inspector Moltek arrived in Berlin at half past six this afternoon, having interrupted his journey to the United States by reason of the death of Von Molteke. The Emperor and Chancellor accompanied the railroad station and they drove to Von Molteke's residence. A consultation was held at the dead man's home in regard to the funeral arrangements, and the suggestion that the body be taken to the United States was not submitted to the Emperor, but was submitted to the Kaiser, who has accepted the acceptance of the invitation to take part in the funeral.

Money in the Treasury.
