The body was subsequently held in a room at the Middleton hotel, where a coroner's inquest was held. The coroner's jury returned a verdict that the death was due to a heart attack, and that there was no visible wound on the part of the body.

CHAMPIONS ACTION OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Chairman J. W. Condie Replies to Statements Made by Preston Correspondent.

The editor of The News is in receipt of the following letter from J. W. Condie, chairman of the Preston, Ida., board of trustees, under date of Oct. 23:

"In your issue of Oct. 16 a report was given by your local correspondent of the proceedings of the village board of this place, and in which article the board as well as the marshal was severely and unjustly criticized. Will you kindly permit me to make a few statements through your columns by way of explanation, and correct any false impressions that may be formed from the above named article, a part of which reads as follows:

"After the municipal election last spring a petition signed by nine-tenths of the business men and four-fifths of the property holders residing within the city limits was presented to the village board asking for the reformation of David Davis as day marshal, and J. W. Condie as night watchman. Right in the face of that petition by a strict party vote the board turned down the petition, and instead of reformation imported a man from Riverdale (for the position)."

"The facts are that at the meeting referred to there were two petitions presented. One contained 141 signatures and asked as stated above, for the reformation of David Davis as day marshal. The other, with 145 signatures, asked for the appointment of Mr. G. N. Nelson to the office of day marshal, and J. W. Condie as night watchman."

"It is true that in our system of American government it is the indisputable right of its people to petition any of its civil institutions for redress of grievances. But in this case the board had taken no action that called for redress. No injustice had been done, and inasmuch as both petitions were signed by nearly the same number of citizens, it was perfectly justified in disregarding both and acting independently in their choice of officers. Could the board be censured for exercising a right granted them by their very election to office?"

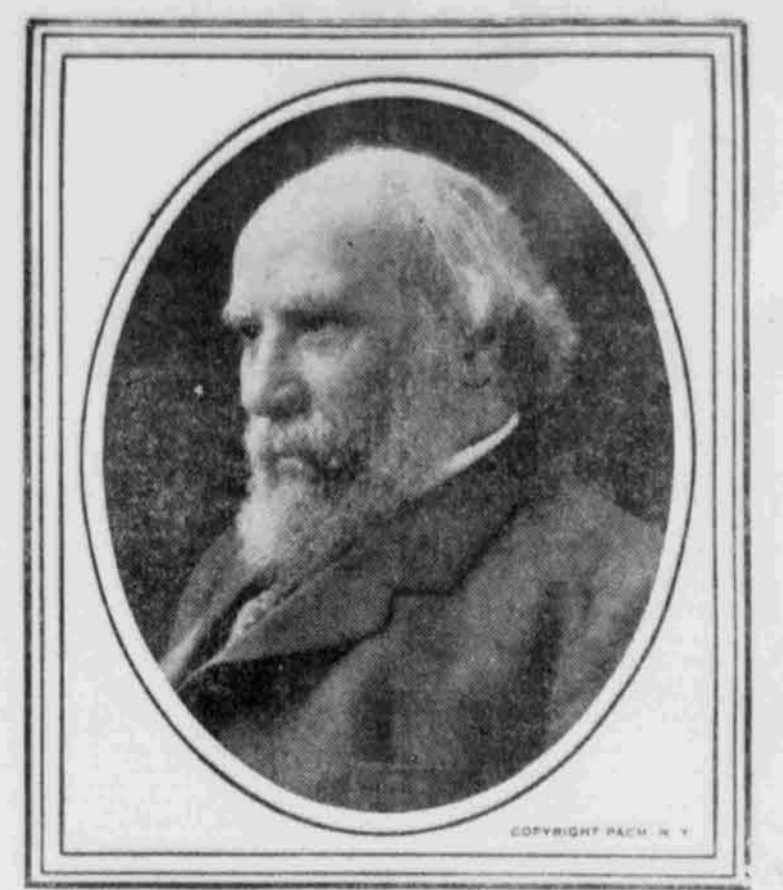
"In the same article the ability of Mr. Nelson as an officer was violently attacked in such language as this: 'Mr. Nelson is a high school graduate, and in that line and has since demonstrated beyond peradventure of a doubt his absolute unfitness for the position, and so more fit to be marshaled than he is a present performing the duties of marshal, night watchman and village road supervisor.'"

SUGAR CITY, Nov. 11.—This section of the country has just experienced the first winter storm. For the past few days it has been raining and storming and snow is falling at the present time. The exceptionally fine fall has made it possible for the farmers and beet growers to get most of the beet crop in before the storm. There is very little out at present and two or three fine days will make it possible to get all beets in. The beet tonnage has been heavier than ever before in the history of this country. The beets have reached the sheds in splendid shape and everyone connected with the raising of this valuable crop is elated over the successful season. The factory paid its men yesterday and many thousands of dollars were paid out for factory labor. The beet growers will be paid Nov. 15.

GEORGE OLNSTEAD IS LAID TO REST

Well Known Superintendent of Montana Division Paid Final Tribute.

FARMER ROBBED IN SALOON

While in Alley in Rear of Resort, He Is Stopped and Relieved of \$70 —O. S. L. Reorganization.

CATELLO, Nov. 11.—The remains of Superintendent George H. Olmstead of the Montana division, who died at Hot Lakes, Or., Friday afternoon, were interred here with Masonic honors Tuesday afternoon. The deceased was well known in the railway circles of this intermountain region, and his loss is very much felt by all concerned. The annual conference of the Second quorum of the Cateello Stake was held Tuesday evening at the Cateello hall, and the weather being quite stormy, President Joseph Heath presided. The report showed a high condition of affairs with hopes of increased activity and further improvement for the near future.

The annual ward conference of the First and Second wards will take place next Sunday; rumors of important changes are the gossip of the week. George Bates, a farmer of Roblin, this county, came to town Tuesday and incidentally visited the saloon district, and displayed the coin of the realm. While in the alley at the rear of the Board of Trade saloon, he was waylaid, stopped and robbed of \$70. The thief that forced him senseless left a deep gash in his forehead, which bled profusely.

The residence of J. R. Williams, 455 north Arthur avenue, was robbed Saturday evening while the folks were up town between the hours of 7 and 11 o'clock. The articles taken were a lady's gold watch and chain, a diamond ring, a brooch, a bracelet, a bag containing some silver and five dollars in gold. No clue to the robbery has been discovered.

Attorney H. W. Winthrop addressed the men's meeting at the Y. M. C. A. Sunday afternoon on the subject "A Lawyer's View of Christianity."
