Logan, Cache Co., Sept. 3.-The board of county commissioners yesterday took action on the petition of D. R. Roberts for a franchise for an electric railroad to run from Preston to Wellsville by way of Hyrum. Roberts, it is said, is acting for the same parties that are applying for similar franchises in other countles and who propose build-ing a line from Preston to Santaquin, When Roberts applied for the fran-chise he refused to divulge the names of the men behind him, and the com-missioners therefore refused to act The promoters finally communicated with the board and a draft of the franchise which the county was willing to grant was submitted to them. They objected to some portions of it, and today it was modified as far as practicable to suit them and pussed.

It gives a franchise for 50 years. quires that construction begin within 15 months; that within one year from the commencement of construction 10 miles of road must be in operation, and the whole must be completed within five years or the franchise be forfeit-

ed.

AN URDINANUE. An ordinance levying a tax and for the assessment of property on both sides of First South street between State and Second East streets, in Paving District No. 7, for the grading, curbing and paving thereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Sait Lake City, Utah:
Section 1. That the City Council does hereby levy the tax and provide for the assessment upon the property hereinafter described abutting on both sides of First South street between State street and Second East street in Paving District No. 7.

This tax is levied to defray the expense

This tax is levied to defray the expense of grading, curbing and paving said portion of said street, and it is hereby adjudged, determined and established that the grading, curbing and paving of said street will thereby benefit the property abutting thereon, and hereinafter described, to the full amount of the estimated cost thereof.

Said property is to be assessed at an equal and uniform rate, in accordance with the linear foot frontage upon said portion of said street.

The cost and expense of making said improvement is estimated at twelve (\$12.00) dollars per linear front foot, and the tax hereby levied and to be assessed upon said property is twelve (\$12.00) dollars per front foot abutting on said portion of said street, and the City Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to assess said property in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, for the purpose herein mentioned.
