The enormous floating dock for Bermuda, built by the Albert Works for the British Government at a cost of \$250,000, is the largest floating dock ever constructed. It was ordered to supply the want, long felt, of a dock in the West Indies in which ships could be laid up for cleaning and repairs. It consists entirely of iron and weighs 350 tons. It is shaped like the letter U, and will raise with ease 10,000 tons, besides its own weight. It is sufficiently large to take in any vessel in the world except the Great Eastern. Its extreme length is 381 feet. Its width, over all, is 123 feet, 9 inches, and its depth 74 feet 5 inches. It is built with two skins, fore and aft, with 20 feet space between them. This space is divided into 48 water-tight divisions. Four steam-engines work the pumps by which the water is discharged from the ballast chambers. It is to be towed entire to the Royal Dockyard at Bermuda, being the first floating dock ever made and transported after completion from an English port. Some danger has been anticipated in towing this huge machine across the Atlantic, but the engineers who have planned and supervised its construction consider it as little likely to founder in a gale as a well-corked bottle.
