Louis next Tuesday, is engaging the attention of club women from one end of the continent to the other, at least 1,000,000 of them. With this showing one is compelled to believe with Hamilton W. Mabie, who said that the greatest agent awf or civilization in the world today was the woman's club.

That is a sweeping assertion, but it comes from the source it does.

The history of the advancement of women's clubs in the last decade, it was in 1890

that the leading club women took up the necessity of united effort, and in that spirit the general federation was formed in New York city. Fifty clubs signed the first roster. By 1892, when the first biennial was held, the membership had grown to 100 clubs, to the amazement of the most thoughtful women.

At that meeting of 1892 nothing was talked of "equal suffrage." Thus was born the first state federations formed in Maine, Massachusetts and Iowa.
