VALLEY EDWARDS.

Dr. George J. Edwards—Edgar Edwards, an elderly resident of northern Utah, died June 7, 1897. He was born in Pike County, Missouri, April 10, 1832. Joined the Church in an early day and continued to serve the cause faithfully until his death at Salt Lake City, Tooele and Cache Valley, spending his life in building various mills, being a hardy entrepreneur and a good man. He was a member of the First Ward, and finally moved to southern Utah, where he spent some years of comparative helplessness, passing away at his home in Grantsville. He was a man of many talents, a man of a serving qualities. He leaves a large family of children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren to mourn his loss. His funeral services were held on June 8, 1897, at St. George. A large procession followed to the cemetery.

COPE CITY, June 24, 1897.—Sister Anna Bailey, the daughter of William and Anna Bailey, died at her home in North Crowley, in Buckinghamshire, England, on the 2nd of October, 1897, was married to Harry Bailey on the 28th day of June, 1895, at Salt Lake City, and died on the 10th day of October, 1897. Her husband had lived a faithful Latter-day Saint, a kind and faithful wife, and devoted mother to all who knew her. She was the mother of six children, five boys and five girls; grandmother to forty-two and great-grandmother to seventy-eight. She was 78 years, 2 months and 3 days, and was the embodiment of the strength, energy and warmth of the heart. She was baptized in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at North Crowley, England, by Elder John Martin, at the time I was traveling and touring in the Manchester conference. I further understand she resided in the Second Ward, and passed away in her home in Ogden City. The choir, under the leadership of Prof. Hinckley sang a solo in her honor. All of Ogden City was beautifully rendered. The members were Brothers Welsh, Hull and Thomas Hall from Salt Lake City. The latter also a widow, whose husband had died in her Bailey and his wife in London for many years, and always looked upon them as a father and mother through the years. She was a woman who had nothing to do with them, not only in her presidency but in all things. Bishop McQuarrie spoke of the good qualities of Sister Bailey, and gave Father Bailey all the strength and countering words he could think of in his fidelity and word, in the loss of a faithful and good wife. Her loss was Sister Bailey's gain. She was laid comfortably away and a long corse followed the remains to the cemetery.
