MODERN STREET CARS.

On Saturday word was received by George H. Matson, secretary of the Og-den Rapid Transit company, from H. H. Spencer and W. J. LEHI.

Incorrect Reports Anent the Pipe Line Water-Beet Crop Prospects. Special Correspondence,

Lehi, July 2.-Lehi people, and espec-ially the officers of the sugar company, are somewhat annoyed over the reports sent from here by the correspondent of the Herald and Tribune, (the same party acting for both papers) regarding the furnishing of water to the farmers from he pipes. The articles are entirely in-

The truth of it is this; as soon as the pipe line is furnished from Bingham to Lehi it will be tested by pumping water through the same and if any of the farmers can utilize the water for irrigating purposes of course, they will be that much ahead.

In regard to the beets I will say that unless rains come soon the bench beets will undoubtedly suffer, but those on the lower lands promise at this date a good crop. I visited Provo Saturday and while there rode over the beet fields and they are looking as well as ever they did, and I made it a particular business to ask the farmers how the water supply was holding out and in every instance they claim they will have sufficient to mature the crop. riding over Provo bench I find there is no crop suffering for want of water and can say that the districts I visited will have as good a beet crop this year as they have ever had.

I have also read communications from all the respective beet districts south, including Sanpete and Sevier countles and conversed with a number of the Utah Sagar Co.'s agents, in those dis-tricts. I find while it is much dryer than usual on most of the lands they will have sufficient water to mature the beet crop. There is one very favorable condition for the beet crop during a dry season and that is this, it is divided up amongst so many farmers that though they only have a little water, they generally have enough to give it to this crop.

She began to fill and the men on board were soon waist deep In water. They threw the cargo over-board but the lighter began slowly to sink. A heavy sea was running. When Captain Becker brought the Seattle near to the lighter in order to save those on board, the tow line connecting the two boats got entangled in the launch's propeller, and she became helpless. The lighter began to sink rapidly, and to save the lives of those on board, Captain Becker dove over the side of his boat and with a knife began cutting away the snarled tow line. This was dangerous work under the overhanging stern of a tossing and rolling steam launch. Three times the captain tack-led the job. The last time they hauled him on board exhausted and unconscious, but he had cleared the screw. The Seattle came alongside the lighter and over fifty lives were saved.

Delay of the Grant.

San Francisco, July 2 .- The trans-

port Grant, which was forced to return to pert last night by the ripping open of the steam pipe which feeds her star-board engine, will probably again start for Nagasaki tonight. While the bursting of the steam pipe was not attended by any serious consequences, the officers of the boat consider it fortunate that the accident did not happen after she had reached the open sea, and heavy weather, as she would have been utterly disabled and unable to make a return trip of any great dis. tance. The accident was due to the rolling of the vessel and the fact that the pipe was not properly set to with-stand the twisting it was subjected to.
