PHILIPPINE FORTIFICATIONS.

Washington, Coc. 31.—The ordering of four additional companies of coast ar-tillery to the Philippines marks sub-stantial progress in the work of coa-structing fortifications in those islands. The national coast defense board esti-mated the cost of its project for the defense of Manila at \$6.168,819 and for Subig bay, 32,248,199. The first appro-priation for that project was made June 28, 1906, since which time a lit-tle more than one half of the work has been done. The entire project will bo tle more than one half of the work has been done. The entire project will be completed in about two years if ample appropriations are made and as the work advances additional companies of artillery will be sent there for duty on the defenses. The coast defense project contem-plated an expediture of \$3,254,244 on the defenses of Honolulu and Pearl Harbor, Hawalian Islands, one-half of which has also been completed.

#### MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES

#### Marked Increase in Their Activity During September.

During September. Washington, Oct. 31.—A marked in-crease in activity in the principal manufacturing industries of the coun-try is indicated for the month of Sep-ember according to the monthly state-ment of imports issued by the bureau of manufacturers of the department of commerce and labor. A large de-crease in the import prices of the prin-cipal manufacturers' material as com-pared with September, 1907. Is shown. Hides and skins show an increase in quantity imported of 50 per cent in excess of the corresponding month of last year. Pig copper shows an increase of 25 per cent, crude India rubber 60 po per cent, tobacco for manufacturing, 50 per cent. While more raw cotton was imported than in September, 1907, the value of raw cotton imports for September of this year shows a de-crease of over 30 per cent. Similar decreases in the import prices per unit of quantity are noted in mearly all articles of importance used in manu-facturing. facturing.
