



Held Without Bail to Answer for The Murder of August Stanke.

BLOODY TRAGEDY AT NAMPA.

Woman of the Town Accidentally Shoots Miner and Then Blows Out Her Own Brains.

DOISE. Idaho, Dec. 13 .- W. C. Simmons, charged with the killing of August Stanke about five weeks ago had his preliminary trial today, and was bound over without bail to stand trial in the district court.

The tragedy occurred out about 12 miles from Boise, in the Highland road district, when the unfortunate man attempted to cross over the land belonging to Percy brothers and the When the men met man Simmons. they began shooting, Simmons beginnig first, with the result that Stanke was killed and Simmons was uninjured. DOUBLE TRAGEDY AT NAMPA.

A double tragedy occurred at an early hour this morning in a house of ill repute at Nampa, In which Grace Davis, an inmate, shot Thomas Dailey and then blew out her brains with the same weapon. The shooting of Dalley was accidental, and that of the woman as a result of remorse over the accident.

Dailey was on his way to Seattle from Boise, from which city he had just come the evening before. He called upon the woman, with whom he was acquainted in Bolse, and spent the night with her in drinking and play-The woman had become ing cards. very intoxicated, and while they were sitting upon a bed in her room, she got hold of a 44-caliber revolver and began flashing it around, taking aim at various objects in the room, when suddenly she pointed it directly at Dailey and asked, "How would you like to have one of these go through you?" Just at that instant the weapon discharged, sending a bullet into Dailey's abdomen, the ball entering his body just above the right hip.

The wounded man sunk to the floor in an unconscious condition, without uttering a word. When the woman saw what she had done, she shrieked and cried frantically for a minute and then, with the words, "My God, what have I done?" placed the revolver to her own head and blew her brains over the room. Death was instantaneous.

THE NEWS FROM POCATELLO.

Special Correspondence. DOCATELLO, Dec. 13.-A bloody tragedy was enacted in the Fort

Hall Indian agency at Bannock creek, 20 miles west of here, Tuesday full blood Bannock Indian, full of the full blood Bannock Ludian, full of the pale face fire water, ran amuck and killed two other Indians with a rifle. The tragedy occurred about 1:30 in the afternoon. The news traveled quickly, and the entire Indian police force besides volunteers, are out for a general man hunt on the trail of the murderer. The killing appears to be a wanton one. He first shot and killed Mrs. Charles Ingatur, firing four shots through her head, which was witnessed by one of her little sons. Bearskin then rode off, but the boy reported the horrible affair to another Indian named Charley Ramsey, who was engaged in horrible affair to another indian named Charley Ramsey, who was engaged in hauling fire wood from the bottoms, and he gave chase after the murderer, but he was shot twice in the forehead, and died instantly, which also was the case of the squaw. Both the Indians are school gradu-

Both the Indians are school gradu-ates of the Fort Hall Indian school. Mrs. Ingatur is the mother of four children, two of whom are at school. Bearskin is 25 years of age and is well known here in Pocatello. As usual in such cases here, the Indian slayer generally commits suicide as scorn as bls nursuer overtakes him but soon as his pursuer overtakes him, but what the outcome will be in this case what the outcome will be in this case is awaited with much interest. Bear-skin started out in a southerly direc-tion and is now supposed to be in the mountains near Malad. It is not be-lieved that he will escape, as his pur-suers are skilled in hunting the trail. The Lemhi Indians will, it is said, move to the Fort Hall reservation ear-ly this spring. They are credited with being a good class of Indians, easily managed by Uncle Sam.
