## WEBER STAKE CONFERENCE

Interesting Addresses in Tabernacle Made by Elders Whitney, Hyrum M. Smith and Others.

## DEATH OF MRS. JANE SMUIN.

Old Resident of Weber Goes to Her Rest at 85—Sunday Funerals—News Notes.

Ogden, July 22.—The quarterly conference of the Weber stake of Zion was held yesterday in the Ogden tabernacle with sessions at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m., President L. W. Shurtliff presiding. The tabernacle choir rendered some very choice music, consisting of choruses, solos and duets.

President Shurtliff reported that during the past three months the teachers have visited 71 per cent of the people. He stated that beginning next month the presidency will again hold ward conferences. The summer meetings of the various organizations he reports are doing a good work.

Elder Andrew Jensen, spoke at length on Pioneer day which comes next Wednesday and admonished its observance among the people. He reviewed the coming of the pioneers to this valley in 1847, just 60 years ago.

Elder Orson F. Whitney, addressed the people on the gift of the Holy Ghost whose mission it is to lead and guide its possessor into all truth.

At the opening of the afternoon session, the general and local authorities were unanimously sustained. Elder J. B. Cardon, of the presidency of the Cache stake expressed his pleasure in attending the conference and hearing the good counsel given and the beautiful singing. He spoke of the sacrifices the Latter-day Saints have made, and the influence of the same developing the character of the people.

Elder Hyrum M. Smith spoke to the people on the growth of the Latter-day Saints, of the homes they have been driven from, which after their departure have remained practically the same as when the saints left them, while the state of Utah has grown rapidly in population. The hand of the Lord has been over His people for good, though their labor and skill they have made this state one of the garden spots of God's creation.

Elder O. F. Whitney also spoke of the growth of the church which now numbers nearly 400,000 and in Zion there are 55 or 56 stakes. As the church progresses, each member must keep pace with its growth or they will die a spiritual death. Those who are not prepared to grow with it fall. Those who live the laws of God grow stronger in love and grace and are thus in the work of the Lord.

In the evening an interesting conference of the Mutual Improvement associations was held.

SHERIFF CAPTURES THIEVES. Typewriters Taken from Salt Lake House by Culprits. Ogden, July 22.—Deputy Sheriff Seymour Clark made a good arrest Saturday night when he took in custody C. A. Stone and Harry Hammesfahr, who are wanted in Salt Lake City on the charge of stealing from the Bredon Supply company four typewriters. The two men came to Ogden Saturday, shipping the typewriters as baggage. They told one of the machines to L. H. Becraft of this city. Deputy Sheriff Clark observed the men's actions which to him were quite suspicious, so he struck up an acquaintance with them and went to a restaurant to have a meal with them. From their conversation he learned that their dealings had been crooked, so he went to the telephone to get assistance when Hammesfahr bolted out of the back door but the officer was too quick for Stone and held him. At the jail he confessed to having stolen the typewriters and implicated Hammesfahr who was later arrested. They were taken to Salt Lake yesterday to answer to the charge.

AERONAUTS COME TO GRIEF. Balloon Trips End Disastrously for Mr. and Mrs. Garda. Ogden, July 22.—Aeronaut Garda and his wife, who during the past week have been giving balloon ascensions exhibitions with parachute drops at Glenwood park, both had exciting experiences, the man on Saturday night and his wife last night. Saturday evening Garda made the ascension all right and came down to within a short distance of the earth all right when suddenly the parachute started rocking and when it came to earth it came with such force he sustained a wrench of the hip and sprained ankle.

Last night Mrs. Garda when coming down fainted and fell some distance into a peach tree and then to the ground. She suffered several cuts and bad bruises especially of the hip. She was picked up in a helpless condition and placed into a vehicle and brought to a doctor's office where her injuries were cared for, which are painful but not serious.

DEATH OF MRS. SMUIN. One of Ogden's Early Settlers Passes Away at 85. Ogden, July 22.—Grandma Jane Smuin, one of the early settlers of Ogden, died Saturday evening at the family residence, near 2247 Monroe avenue, of heart disease which brought on dropsy. She was aged 85 years and 12 days. When a young woman in her native land, England, she joined the Latter-day Saint Church and emigrated to Utah 27 years ago. A son and three daughters are left to mourn her demise. Funeral services over her remains were arranged for this afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Fourth ward meetinghouse.

The ward choir sang several appropriate selections and Mrs. Mary Farley sang "Not Half Has Ever Been Told." Bishop Robert McConkie, Patriarch Lorin Farr and David McKay were the speakers. They eulogized feelingly the life of the deceased, his many acts of goodness, his devotion to the Latter-day Saint Church, in which he has spent many years of faithful service, and his love for his family.

MRS. RENSTROM LAID TO REST. That Mrs. Caroline Renstrom, wife of Bishop A. P. Renstrom, was beloved by all who knew her, was evidenced Saturday afternoon at the funeral services over her remains at the Huntsville meetinghouse, commencing at 2 o'clock. The large church was taxed to its capacity, and the funeral cortege which followed her remains to the Huntsville cemetery, was many blocks long. A wealth of beautiful floral tributes covered the bier as silent tokens of love and sympathy.

The services were presided over by Bishop's Counselor Charles Wood. Beautiful music was furnished by the ward choir, and solos were sung by C. S. Schade and Miss D. D. McKay. President C. F. Middleton, Patriarch David McKay, John L. Herrick, Charles W. Ross and Mrs. W. W. Givellman were the speakers. The many virtues and noble traits of character of the deceased, together with her activity in church capacities, were eulogized, and the family was comforted in the hope of a resurrection.
