LOCAL BRIEFS.

Many Attend Social—Eighty women attended yesterday afternoon's social given by the James H. McKim Society at the residence of Mrs. W. H. Jones.

Food Displays Covered—In accordance with notification from the food commission, exhibitors are covering their fruit and vegetable stands with mosquito netting.

Stomach to Speak—The Volunteers of America will have an address this evening in their Commercial street chapel from Rev. P. A. Simulian and F. M. Howell is to sing.

Burying Fred Waters—The Utah Light & Railway company began excavating along Richards street for the burial of its victim, Fred Waters, this morning, and connecting with the buildings on the adjoining blocks.

Prof. Higelow May Come—Prof. Higelow of the Weather Bureau at Washington may be to Salt Lake this week on a transcontinental trip. He has been examining hydrographic stations at the Salt Lake and other correlative phenomena, in which he is a recognized expert.

Putting in Regulator Valve—The Gas & Coke company is putting in a great regulator valve at the corner of West Temple and First South streets, for controlling the pressure throughout the business section of the city. This has necessitated a large excavation.

Poultrymen Getting Busy—The Utah Poultry Association held its first meeting at the Masonic hall last evening, at the Commercial club. It was determined to make the best display possible at the coming fair, also to give an exhibition of dressed poultry and eggs at the January show of the association.

Odell's Return—George T. Odell and party will be in New York next week from their extended European tour by automobile, expecting to reach Salt Lake Sept. 25. On the return of the date of arrival Mr. Odell will be unable to serve on the presidential reception committee, and the governor has been so notified.

Price Degree Team Here—The Modern Woodmen of America prize degree team of Denver, in the city from Seattle where it won the first prize over 20 other teams. An exhibition drill was given this noon, on Market street, for the benefit of the Salt Lake organization. The team includes 16 members clad in showy uniforms.

New Sewer District Planned—A new sewer district in the southern part of the city, covering about eight miles, was recommended by the council last night. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000 and will be paid for out of the bond fund. The district will include all the streets between West Temple and Second West streets and Ninth South and Tenth South streets.

Mrs. Wood to Lecture—Mrs. Emily Towner Wood, of Kansas, lecturer and club worker, will lecture tomorrow night, in Barrett hall on "The Brutality of Hypnotism," under the auspices of the Utah State Council of Women. She has been lecturing the convention at Seattle, and is returning as a Topeka editor, and is a cousin of Warden Pratt of the Utah State Prison.

U. S. S. A. Meets—The executive committee of the Utah State Sunday school association met in Salt Lake yesterday in furtherance of the program for the annual convention to be held at Provo, Sept. 20 to Oct. 1 and 2. A special speaker will be Mrs. Mary F. Briner of Chicago who is engaged with the International Sunday school committee. A conference of Sunday school workers will be held at Provo on the 23rd inst. and in this city on the 29.

McMillin Returns—Hugh A. McMillin, secretary of the Utah commission for the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, returned to Salt Lake yesterday after spending several weeks at the fair. The showing made by Utah, he says, was excellent. He said that he met several Grand Army veterans who visited the exposition and they talked highly of the exposition. Mr. McMillin says that he has not received official notification of his appointment as census enumerator.

May Handle Mail in Autos—if the experiments which are being made this week at Los Angeles in utilizing the city mail with an automobile, are successful Postmaster Thomas says he hopes to have the service adopted in Salt Lake. The distance to be traveled in Salt Lake City make the need for more rapid conveyance very pressing, as the present method of carrying mail between the railroad stations and the postoffice is a handicap to rapid delivery.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TO ANSWER STRETT

Meeting Held Yesterday at Commercial Club Starts Investigation of Director.

At the meeting of the executive committee of the G. A. R. encampment held yesterday in the Commercial club rooms, a committee was appointed to investigate the charges alleged to have been made against the committee by Col. F. M. Strett executive director of the encampment, on the day of his departure from this city for the east recently. The committee named is composed of the following: Edward P. Colburn, chairman; George A. Black, M. M. Kaighn, Frank H. Stephens and Fletcher Harris. It is expected the committee will be ready to report the early part of next week, when another meeting of the executive committee will be called.

At the time the encampment had not yet been received, no action was taken on the matter of passing upon this report of the auditor, who was named to check up the accounts and reports to the executive committee. Some of the methods used by Col. Strett in carrying out his work of the encampment have just come to light. It is said that Strett told the executive committee that it had been customary for many years past for the town in which the encampment was held to pay the expenses of all the past commanders in chief to attend the encampment. On this representation, it is said, the local committee endeavored to do as their predecessors in entertaining the G. A. R. were alleged to have done. Later Col. Strett was told to remark: "I have succeeded in establishing the innovation of a custom which should have been established years ago, in which the expenses of the past commanders-in-chief will be paid to the encampment."

During the discussion yesterday afternoon made by Judge O. W. Powers, George A. Black, M. M. Kaighn, E. F. Colburn, W. J. Halloran and others. The committee making the investigation will attend to the matter of present to the executive committee, in connection with their report, which will be given to the public after being passed upon by the executive committee.
