A Nice Operation.

Yesterday, Dr. W. R. Pike, of Provo, assisted by Doctors J. M. Benedict and O. C. Ormsby, performed a very skillful operation on the person of Mr. David Dibble, of Springville, by which the right leg was amputated above the knee. The injury which necessitated the removal of the limb, was sustained about 14 years ago, the ankle being fractured, and the bone of the foot dislocated, so as to require the patient's walking upon the end of his toes. The compulsory use of the knee, for divers purposes, thenceforth, caused the inflammation of that joint and eventually demanded the amputation. The two assistant surgeons speak in high terms of Dr. Pike's operation, the first of the kind in his practice. He is a young practitioner of skill and ability and will doubtless attain to eminence in his profession.

Church Hands Excursion.—On Monday, the 25th inst., the employees of the Church will participate in a grand excursion to Lake Point, taking the regular train on the Utah Western at 8:30 in the morning and returning at 8:30 p.m. of the same day. The Tenth Ward Band will accompany the excursion, as well as a string band to furnish the music for a grand ball to be held at the Lake Point hotel during the day. Bathing, base ball and other amusements will also be furnished those who attend. This is the first occasion of the kind enjoyed by the public work hands for 20 years, and we sincerely trust it will be a complete success in every particular. The procession of excursionists will form at half-past seven o'clock on the morning of the 25th and march to the depot.

"Dispatch" Notes.—Thirteen cars of railroad iron left Ogden on Tuesday, for the Utah Southern extension.

The statement that the parents of Mr. Shell who died in Ogden Tuesday morning, had been informed of his death, was incorrect. No communication had been held with them.

The Workingmen's Co-operative Boot and Shoe Manufactory of Ogden was entered by burglars Tuesday night, and about \$70 worth of boots stolen.

The Union Pacific pay car arrived in Ogden yesterday forenoon and paid off the employees of the road.

Will Defend Himself.—We had a call this morning from O. C. Ormsby, Esq., the popular physician and surgeon of Logan, Cache County, who is spending a few days in our midst. He informs us, in regard to the suit to be brought against him for malpractice, that he has the confidence and sympathy of the leading medical professors in our community, and has engaged the best legal counsel to be obtained, with the intention of defending himself against what he considers an unjust and malicious action.

Dr. Ormsby's reputation for talent and skill in his profession, has always been excellent, and we sincerely hope and believe that he will clear himself of the imputation now cast upon him.

From the South.—Mr. A. O. Smoot, Jr., assessor of Utah County, came up from Provo last evening and will return in the morning.

Mr. J. F. Wells returned last night from a successful canvassing trip through Sanpete and Utah Counties, in the interest of the "Contributor."

Obsequies.—The funeral services of Sister Sarah Poulter were held at her residence this morning at 10 o'clock, as announced. The assembly was first addressed by Pres. A. M. Cannon, then by Bishop Edward Hunter, who had known the deceased for 20 years, and by Elder Martin Lenz, who was intimately acquainted with her in early days. All bore united testimony to her faith and integrity as a Latter-day Saint, and made other remarks suitable to the occasion.

Again at Work.—The Deseret Paper Mill, which has been idle since May on account of repairs and the introduction of steam power, started up again on Monday, and the first lot of paper reached us yesterday. The mill will continue in regular operation hereafter.

CITY ASSESSMENT, 1870.
TO THE TAX PAYERS OF SALT LAKE CITY.

In accordance with the provisions of Sections 15 and 16 of "An Ordinance to Provide for Assessing and Collecting City Taxes," passed March 12th, 1870, the City Council of Salt Lake City, will, on Tuesday, August 23rd, 1870, at 2 o'clock p.m., in the council chamber of the City Hall of said city, sit as a Board of Equalization, to determine all complaints made in regard to the assessed value of any property for the year 1870.

During its sessions said board will hear and consider any petitions which may be presented to "remit or abate the taxes of any insane, idiotic, infirm or indigent person to an amount not exceeding five dollars for the current year, agreeable to the provisions of said ordinance."

Let all persons take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
