DES MOINES, Ia., 22.—From the Superintendent of the railroad, who was on the train, I got the following particulars of the C. R. and I. P. railroad robbery, last night: "The train left Council Bluffs, at 5 o'clock, with four coaches and two sleepers. The rear sleeper was filled with a company of aristocratic Chinese on the way to New Eng- land Colleges, there was also two baggage and express cars, in which was the through California Mail and Express matter, consisting of two thousand dollars in the ex- press safe and three tons of bullion. When about sixty-five miles west of this City, at about 8:30 o'clock, at a sharp curve in the road and at an insulated spot with no houses within several miles in any direc- tion, the train moving at about twenty-five miles an hour, the engineer, John Rafferty, suddenly saw a rail move from its place about sixty feet before the engine. He instantly reversed the engine and applied the air brakes, and while in the act of doing it bullets came pelting into the engine like hail. The engine ran into the bank, and turned over, throwing out the engineer and fireman, the former falling on his head. It is supposed he was killed by the concussion, as no bullet wounds were found on his body. The fire- man escaped unhurt. The train being very heavy ran about a hun- dred feet, and stopped. Two bag- gage cars were badly smashed. As soon as the train was stopped six large athletic men, masked in full Kuklux style, appeared at the ex- press car in which were the conduc- tor, Wm. Smith, Superintendent Royce, the ex-messenger, John Burgess and three other persons. They commenced firing rapidly into the car, yelling, "Get out of there, d—n you, get out of there." Bullets passed through the clothes of the conductor, one grazed the skull of the baggage man, and one side of the head of the ex-messen- ger. The inmates jumped out, when they were ordered to the rear under cover of half a dozen navy revolvers. Two of the robbers marched up and down, shouting, "Out of sight, d—n ye, or we will shoot ye." The robbers then took about two thousand dollars from the express safe, and cut open the mail bag, but took no letters, and mounted each a horse and rode off across the prairie in a southerly direction, the whole being done in less than ten minutes. They fortu- nately did not cut the telegraph wires, and Superintendent Royce at once hastened to the nearest station, and telegraphed in all di- rections. Engines and parties of men were sent out from Council Bluffs on the Burlington and other roads, to intercept the robbers in a south- erly direction. Their dress and voices indicated that they were regu- lar bushwhackers, and they evi- dently intended to get the usual valuable express matter sent by the road on Mondays, but which went through on an extra train on Sun- day night. The robbers, during the day, stole a spike bar and hammer from a hand car house, at the near- est station. They drew the spikes from one end of the rail and fast- ened a small cord to the end of the rail, and secreted themselves sev- eral rods away, and as the engine approached they pulled the rail out

of its place. The promptness of the engineer and the air brake saved the passengers from harm, and not one was injured. A track was at once laid around the wrecked cars, and the train resumed its trip, arriving here at 9:30 this morning, bringing the dead body of the engineer, who resided here, and leaves a wife and children.

It seems that the postmaster of several states have been furnishing the public with official stamps, the post office department. Letting under such official stamps are seen from other points of destination to the dead letter office, as they are known to be private letters. The postmaster in Ohio recently re- ceived 200 official stamps, and sent 140 although the circulars of the Post Office Department cautions post- masters from selling and the public from buying these stamps.
