

TELEGRAPHIC. INDIAN EXCITEMENT.

The Murder of a Sheepherder the Beginning of Trouble.

NO SERIOUS FRICITION FEARED.
The Redskins Would Like to Fight With the Settlers but Not With the Soldiers.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., May 31.—Reports of the killing of several men by the Cheyenne Indians at Lamee Deer agency are not verified. It is not believed that any one was killed except a sheepherder named Haver, whose murder a week ago caused the excitement. The settlers and cowboys determined to avenge his death and give the Cheyenne an object lesson to deter them from similar acts in the future. They sent all the women and children to places of safety, armed themselves and congregated at the agency and demanded the surrender of the Indians accused of murdering Haver. The Indians armed themselves and made threatening gestures against the whites, but no battle has been fought as yet. The Cheyenne are not so numerous here, as far as known. The Lamee Deer agency is situated in the heart of the Indian country. The Cheyenne declare that they do not want to fight the soldiers, but are anxious to have a struggle with the white settlers and cowboys.

There is a conflict of authority between the Indian agent and the sheriff of Coconino county. The sheriff's deputies were ordered off the reservation by the agent. They refused to obey the order, and a warrant for their arrest was issued. The agent is now in the field with his men, and the sheriff is also in the field with his men. The result of their expedition is not known. The trouble is due to the charges of settlers that the Indians kill and steal their cattle, and counter charges of Indians that the settlers continually intrude on the reservation.

Gov. Smith wired President McKinley today asking for aid in the case of the Cheyenne. He is asking that an armed force be sent to the reservation to protect the settlers. Smith says he can and will resist the Cheyenne as soon as the excitement dies.
