CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, 16.—Schurz, from the foreign relations committee, reported the House bill for representation of the U. S. at the Vienna exposition, with an amendment increasing the appropriation from one hundred to three hundred thousand dollars.

Chandler opposed any appropriation, because experience demonstrated that Americans participating in such expeditions had their investments appropriated by foreigners.

Sanitary moved to make the amount \$150,000 instead of \$300,000. The amendment of the committee, making the amount \$500,000 was adopted.

Carpenter said he had voted to increase the amount because if an appropriation was to be made at all, that was little enough, but as long as the Washington monument was still as at present in an unfinished, dilapidated condition, the shame and reproach of every American in the eyes of every foreigner visiting the land, would never be removed.

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first, 1874, redeem their circulating notes as such localities as are now or may be hereafter designated by law, either in coin or in U. S. legal tender notes, shall be exempt from the requirements under the existing law as to holding a reserve of lawful money of the U. S.; provided that nothing herein contained shall authorize any national gold bank, established under an act entitled "An Act to provide for the Redemption of 3 per cent. Temporary Loan Certificates and for the Increase of National Bank Notes," approved July 12, 1870, to redeem their circulating notes in anything but gold coin of the U. S.

"Section 4. That section C of that act entitled, "An Act to provide for the Redemption of 3 per cent. Temporary Loan Certificates and for the Increase of National Bank Notes," approved July 12, 1870, be and is hereby repealed.

"Sec. 5. That Banks without circulation may be organized under the provisions of "An Act to Provide a National Currency, Secured by a Pledge of U. S. Bonds, and to Provide for the Circulation of National Bank Notes," approved June 3rd, upon deposit with the treasurer of the U. S. of not less than \$10,000 in U. S. registered bonds, as provided in section 16 of that act.

"Sec. 6. That it shall be the duty of the comptroller of the currency to cause to be examined each year the plates, dies, bed pieces and other material from which the national bank circulation is printed, in whole or in part, and file in his office annually a correct list of the same; and such material as shall have been used in printing the notes of the national bank which are in liquidation or have closed business, shall be destroyed under such regulation as shall be prescribed by the comptroller of the currency, and approved by the Secretary of the Treasury, and the expenses of such examination and destruction shall be paid out of any appropriation made by Congress for the special examination of national banks and bank plates."

Morton offered a resolution instructing the committee of the House to inquire whether there is a legal State government in Louisiana, and if so by whom constituted. He said he was authorized by the majority of the committee to offer the resolution.

On motion of Cassey the Secretary of the Treasury was requested to inform the Senate whether the Union Pacific and Central Pacific have complied with the act of July 3, 1862, requiring that after the completion of their roads 5 per cent of the net earnings shall be applied to the payment of the interest and the redemption of the principal of their bonds, and in case of non-compliance, give the reasons therefor.

WASHINGTON, 16.—After some unimportant business, debate opened on the bill for the admission of Colorado as a State. Robert's opposed the measure.

At the expiration of the morning hour, the bill went over without action.

The House went into committee of the whole on the consular bill. Without making much progress the committee adjourned and the House proceeded to the consideration of the Oklahoma Territory bill.

The Oklahoma bill was laid on the table.

The Senate bill amending the Agricultural College act passed.

WASHINGTON, 16.—The Wilson Credit Mobilier committee today examined Durant at length in regard to the history, objects, and results of the Credit Mobilier, but developed no new facts.

The Poland committee examined Schaffel, who gave full account of his purchase of stock, which was simply made as a good investment in a regular business way.

Senator Patterson testified that he never owned any Credit Mobilier stock, though he had done so at one time if he had had the money. He never received nor purchased any property which directly or indirectly was connected with the Credit Mobilier.

Senator Wilson testified to his investment in Credit Mobilier through Oke Ames. His statement is identical with that already published.

John A. Bingham testified to his purchase of stock of Credit Mobilier by the advice of Ames. He made them because he had full faith in Ames' business sagacity, but he never made any transactions except such as he believed he had a perfect right to do without any consideration of the public interest.

New York: The Evening Levitt, senior editor of the Independent, was yesterday struck with paralysis. He remains in an unconscious state.

The provision of Thos. Miller for utilizing water for extinguishing fire and cleaning streets at a cost of \$250,000, has been referred to a committee of the Board of Aldermen.

Full confirmation has arrived of the lease of Samana Bay to an American Company, and its ratification by the Department of Commerce.

A fire in the dry goods store of Owen Jones, 187 Eighth Avenue, damaged stock and building in the sum of \$3,000.

PHILADELPHIA.—The Mechanics Bank, Lancaster, was yesterday robbed of \$40,000 in bonds, two thirds being in gold in conversion with the third stole the bonds.

CHICAGO.—The first Congressional church, of which F. Goodwin is pastor, situated at the corner of Washington and Main Streets, one of the finest structures in the city, was burned to night at half past seven o'clock. The building and organ cost about \$10,000. Insurance \$100,000 of which, on the building, is in the Fireman's Fund and Union of San Francisco, \$5,000 each, and \$700 each on the organ in the same companies. Dr. Goodwin's residence, adjoining the church, was saved, which was his library of 200 volumes, which was in the study in the basement of the church. The fire was caused by a defective flue.
