SAN FRANCISCO, 20.—The Broderick

conform to and abide by the constitution

and by-laws of the club, and to

submit to the vote of the majority

constitutionally expressed on all occasions

affecting the interests of the club."

Judge Lake, having to-day overruled

the demurrer of the defendants De

Young, of the Chronicle, indicted for

libel on R. H. Luntan, charged De

Young surrendered himself to custody

and immediately made application to

Judge Wallace of the Supreme Court for

a habeas corpus. Judge Wallace ex-

pressed the opinion that Judge Lake

might have erred in refusing to allow

the grand jury brought into court to be

challenged, but took the application for

a habeas corpus in advisement for a

day or two. As the case is one of mi-

By the way, the inquest held

on the body of a man who died sud-

denly at the Washington hotel last

night, it appears that the man was a

stranger, a Chilean or Spaniard, who

applied to the hotel for a room, and

was found dead in the room, which was

tion showed that the cause of death

was disease of the heart, and a verdict

was given accordingly. The body has

reached was found dead with his neck

broken and his head crushed.
