

PROTESTANT WORSHIP IN SPAIN

Restrictions Placed on Non-Catholic Denominations Investigated by State Department.

NO CEREMONIES IN PUBLIC.

Distinctly Ecclesiastical Architecture Calculated to Proclaim Character of Building Not Permitted.

Washington, May 10.—The restrictions under which non-Catholic religious denominations must worship in Spain, have been made the subject of an investigation by the state department. The report of former Minister Collier in 1906 was today made public.

By authority of the constitutional provision that no other ceremonies for manifestations of religious worship shall be permitted in public except those of the Catholic religion, an emblem of religion is never permitted to be erected upon a Protestant edifice, says Mr. Collier. He stated that within the last few years when a cross was erected upon a church at Barcelona, the king himself wrote a letter which resulted in the cross being removed. Generally the door of a Protestant church is permitted to open upon a public street, said Mr. Collier, although it is not allowed, during service, to remain open so as to attract attention to the worship. Distinctly ecclesiastical architecture calculated to proclaim the building as the seat of a form of worship is not allowed.

The minister said that there was more toleration shown toward Protestant worship at the date when he reached there than there had been in 15 or 20 years before.

NINE PEOPLE DROWNED IN SUSQUEHANNA RIVER

Wilkesbarre, Pa., May 9.—Six men, a woman and two children were drowned this afternoon in the Susquehanna river near this city by the capsizing of a rowboat in which they had started for an outing.

The boat drifted into the swift current and began to dip water. The occupants became panic-stricken and called for assistance. Before aid could reach them the boat filled with water and sank. None of the occupants could swim and they were swept down the river to their deaths.

SEEKING A FORTUNE.

New York, May 10.—Mrs. Lottie McCall, a widow, and her daughter, Miss Elizabeth McCall, 19 years old, came to New York last Friday from their home in New Orleans to collect a legacy of \$50,000, but last night they were forced to seek shelter in the municipal lodging house. Mrs. McCall is a niece of James McCall, a well-known Alabama horseman and she has two uncles in Chicago, both named McCall, who are in prosperous circumstances.

CONFERENCE OF RESTRICTIONS ON JEWS IN MOROCCO

Washington, May 10.—One year has elapsed since Surgeon B. L. Wright, U. S. N., treated the first case of tuberculosis at the naval hospital at Las Animas, Colorado, with the mercury treatment, the surgeon's own discovery. During that time statistics of the hospital show that of those cases showing marked improvement 100 per cent took mercury treatment and none took routine treatment solely.

Of the fatal cases 31 per cent took the mercurial treatment and 68 per cent took routine treatment only. Wright has recommended that mercury be adopted as the regular treatment for tuberculosis at Las Animas, making it compulsory at the discretion of the hospital staff.

Of the 127 tuberculosis patients at the hospital at present, 92 are voluntarily taking the mercury treatment.

A HUGE METEORITE.

Permission Given to Remove One from Tacoma National Forest.

Seattle, Wash., May 10.—United States government has given permission to Horace G. Herold, a timber cruiser, residing in Tacoma, to remove from the Washington national forest a huge meteorite weighing nearly 12 tons. The meteorite was found by Herold in December, 1907. Because he feared that the government would not permit him to remove the prize, which is wanted by the Smithsonian institution, he has persistently refused to tell its location. It is supposed to be the largest meteorite in the world. Herold says that it is 4 feet thick 6 feet wide and 10 feet long.

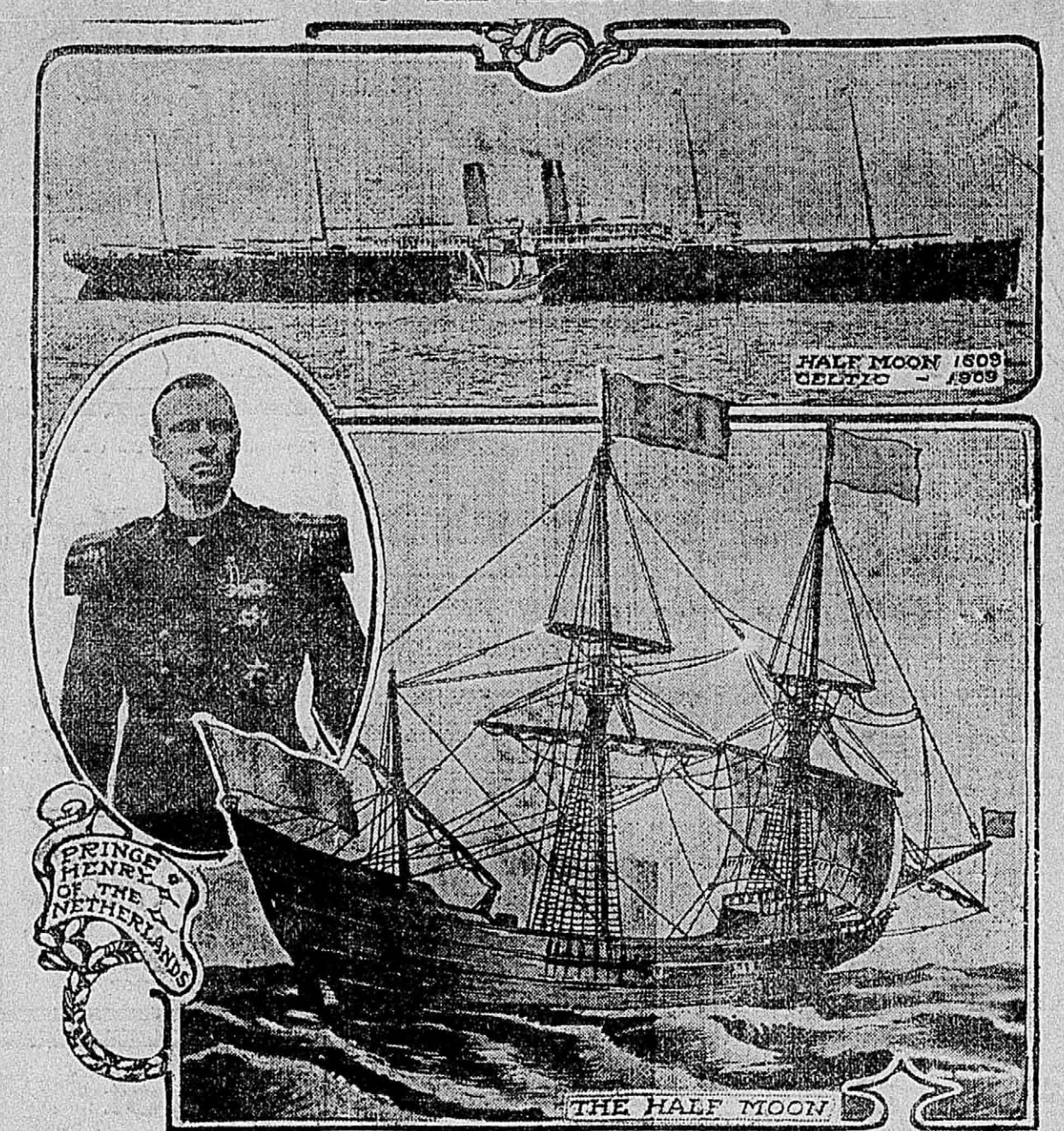

HOLLAND'S PRINCE AND SHIP HE SENDS TO THE HUDSON-FULTON CELEBRATION



Good progress is being made in completing the ship Half Moon, recently launched from the navy yard at Amsterdam. This queer looking craft, which the people of the Netherlands are sending as a token of their friendship for America, is expected to prove one of the most attractive features of the naval parade to be held in connection with the Hudson-Fulton celebration on the Hudson river in October. When rigged and fitted out the Half Moon will be an exact reproduction of the vessel sailed by Capt. Hudson centuries ago. The ship is built of heavy oak timbers and has the high poop and long nosed prow only to be seen in old prints of ancient Dutch and Spanish galleons. She is of about 80 tons, length 63 feet, beam 15 feet, and she draws seven and a half feet of water. Her crew will number 20 men. The Half Moon is being fitted with three masts and sails of ancient pattern, while her armament will consist of several antique cannon handed down from early generations of Dutch adventurers. She will be ready in July and will be shipped on one of the Holland-America liners for transports across the Atlantic. On Sept. 27 she will make her official entry into Sandy Hook, after which she will be handed over to the American committee in charge of the Hudson-Fulton celebration. Prince Henry of the Netherlands heads the committee in charge of the construction of the Half Moon.

Miss Helman, who is 22 years old, and remarkably pretty, was born in Egypt of German and Italian parents, and has lived most of her life in Italy. She has come to America to visit relatives in New York and Louisiana.

She said she was told to look out for herself as young women were seized in the streets of New York and sold as slaves.

A HUMAN SACRIFICE.

Bureau of Insular Affairs Makes Public Special Report on One.

Washington, May 10.—The bureau of insular affairs has made public a special report of an investigation into a human sacrifice offered up by the tribe of the Bagobos in the Davao district of Moro province in the Philippines.

The date of the tribe, as well as two men and two women, was sentenced to life imprisonment for the crime but they were paroled upon the solemn pledge of the entire tribe never to repeat such a sacrifice. The indirect result of the sacrifice was years of drought and misfortune for the tribe. But its immediate reason, as set forth in the report, was the death of the husbands of two women of the tribe—the same who were later sentenced to imprisonment—and the fact that the widows could find no successors for them. It was to satisfy the spirits of their departed ones that the sacrifice was deemed necessary.

A deaf and half-blind crippled Indian slave who had been a wedding gift was picked out for a sacrifice and after many weird tribal ceremonies was killed by a lance wielded by both women.
