**Who is Governor?**—The question as to who is the present incumbent of the gubernatorial chair of this Territory, came up in the District Court, yesterday morning, at the opening of the case of *Adkinson vs. The Wasatch and Jordan Valley Railroad*. A motion was made by the counsel for the defense, to restore to the jury box the names of the 12 jurors, discharged by the court several days ago, in accordance with the act passed by the Legislature redistricting the representation of the Territory and taking away from the Third District the counties of Weber, Box Elder, Cache, Summit and Rich, the places of residence of the discharged jurors. The basis for the motion was, that the redistricting act so passed was invalid, because it was signed by George W. Emery, who, it was claimed, was not Governor at the time; and that the persons whose names were drawn to serve as jurors, could not lawfully be discharged by the court, because they were selected according to law and made the jurors for the term "For all cases," by an act of Congress, to ignore which was to permit the Legislature enactment to nullify the Act of Congress. The matter was argued pro and con, and finally decided by Judge Hunter, who held that Mr. Emery was Governor until his successor had qualified, and that the court had the right to discharge the jurors, as it had done. An exception was taken, and no doubt there will yet be more of the matter.

**Choir Concerts.**—The bills are now out for the grand and instrumental concert, by the 18th Ward choir, assisted by the children of the Sunday School, in the Ward Meeting-house, next Tuesday and Wednesday evenings. It is an attractive program. The choir, under the leadership of Mr. Horace E. Whitney, will render three choruses: "Hark, Apollo," by Bishop; "Farewell to the Forest," by Mendelssohn; and "Day of Gladness," by Verdi. Messrs. H. G. and O. F. Whitney are down for a flute duet, and Misses Edith Clawson, Helen Whitney, Annie Lindsay, Mrs. Vilate Young, Messrs. H. G. Whitney, J. D. Spencer, D. C. Young and other popular singers will take part in the songs, duets, quartettes and choruses of the entertainment. Mrs. Fanny Thatcher is the accompanist, and H. G. Whitney, conductor. The performance will conclude, with the laughable farce, "Kil or Cure," by the juveniles of the Sunday School. Of these are Masters Chas. **The Huntsville Deer Killing.**—The Junction has an article, this morning, on the recent deer killing in Huntsville, in which it is shown that the persons who were accused some time ago of the unlawful practice of killing deer out of season near that place, were in reality not guilty of the offense. The following extract from the article explains: "Deer meat it was proved, had been brought into Ogden a day or two after the time allowed for the killing of game, which of course was presumptive evidence of a violation of the statute, and a thorough investigation was at once instituted. Developments proved, however, that the animals had been killed before the limited time had expired, but on account of the deep snow the parties who had done the killing were unable to get the game home, and had to abandon it until help could be procured from the neighbors. The necessary assistance was forthcoming, and on the 21st of January a large party went out and brought in the deer. The hunting party, it would seem, contracted to furnish deer in this city, and accordingly brought it down, knowing that it had been captured within the time allowed by statute, and not supposing for an instant that they would be accused of law breaking."
