

RIGHTFUL CRASH TO DEATH

Terrible Rear-End Collision on the D.L. & W.R.R. at Paterson, N.J.

SIX PERSONS ARE KILLED. Twenty others injured. Several of them fatally-scenes after the disaster.

New York, Nov. 29.—The eastbound express on the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad, while standing outside the station at Paterson, N. J., at 7:45 tonight, was run into by a 200-ton moving accommodation train from Philadelphia, N. J., to Jersey City.

At least six people were killed and there are now twenty injured at the hospital at Paterson, several of whom may die.

The dead are: Mrs. Mary Rowe, wife of David Rowe of Ithaca, N. Y., and two daughters; Walter Welbrock, Cornell College, Ithaca, N. Y.; Miller Craig, of Turk City, and one unknown woman.

David Rowe will die. The injured are: Miss Agnes McDonald, Oxford, N. Y., both legs broken; Samuel Mendelshohn, Wilkesbarre, Pa., broken; Miss Mame Doyle, Binghamton, Pa., broken and crushed.

John White, Ithaca, leg broken, badly cut by glass. Lewis Baron, Dover, N. J., face and leg badly cut.

Miss Freedman, Scranton, Pa., legs crushed and head bruised. Mrs. Hensen, Brooklyn, thought to be internally injured.

to leave the train at that point were about to be discharged.

"Under the circumstances those in charge of train No. 96 seem to be wholly culpable. All of the crew of that train have been suspended."

Daniel McCormick, of Detroit, was taken to a hospital in Hoboken. He was in the smoking car, the third from the rear of the Buffalo express, when the crash came. He said:

"I was sitting near the front of the car. I was pitched, it seemed to me, clear into another car, for when I was able to realize where I was I found myself pinned under a heavy woman and my right foot wedged in between the broken end of a seat and the side of the car."

"The car stove seemed to explode, scattering the live coals, through the window. How the cars did not catch fire I do not understand."

"I managed to crawl out of the wreck and then the sight that met me was horrifying. The two rear cars were reduced to match wood. The means of the wounded were dreadful. I tried to render some assistance, but found myself unable to do so because of my crushed foot."

Harper Brothers' Affairs. New York, Nov. 29.—John W. Harper of the firm of Harper & Brothers, which assigned yesterday to the State Trust company, said today that the members of the Harper family will soon meet the officers of the trust company and representatives of other creditors for the arrangement of the business.

It is believed all the creditors will give the Harpers their active support. The periodical publications of the house will be continued with the exception of Literature in its American form.

The firm will probably return to its earlier policy, that of importing an imprinted edition of this English weekly. The editor of Literature in this country, John K. Knickerbocker, has assumed the editorship of the Weekly, no editor of the Bazar has yet been appointed to succeed Mrs. Sangster.

PROGRESS IN AGRICULTURE Secretary Wilson Reports Excellent Work for the Past Year.

Fig. Rubber Tree, Hardy Grain, Orange, Cotton, Etc.—Irrigation Experiments—New Alfalfa.

Washington, Nov. 29.—The annual report of Secretary Wilson summarizes an immense amount of work done by the agricultural department during the past year.

The division of entomology has done valuable work this year in showing fruit-growers on the Pacific coast the proper method of fertilizing Smyrna figs. It is believed that in a few years the Pacific coast will be able to produce the fine figs as are imported from the Mediterranean.

The department has gathered much information regarding the plants which supply India rubber and gutta percha and expects during the coming year to locate in our island possessions zones suitable for the culture of these plants.

The United States now imports about \$30,000,000 worth of rubber annually and it is thought that a large portion of this supply can be raised in our new possessions. The same is true of Egyptian cotton, of which we import \$2,000,000 worth annually.

WAR OFFICE HAS CASUALTY REPORT

British Officials Refused to Give Out the Information to Public. RUMOR OF 500 IN LOSSES.

Hard to See Upon What Gen. Methuen Base His Claim of a Victory.

New York, Nov. 30.—A dispatch to the World from London says: The casualty list of the Modder river fight is awaited with the keenest interest.

A rumor is current that the English losses, including both killed and wounded, is beyond 500. Distressing scenes were witnessed about the war office, where relatives of the officers and men engaged in the battle waited in agonized suspense for news.

It is understood that the war office received the first rough estimate of the casualties at 6 p. m. but refused to give out any information.

The intimated language of Gen. Methuen's dispatch has excited unfavorable comment. The World correspondent says in military circles that Lord Methuen is prone to such abillities.

Remark on Roberts. Columbus, O., Nov. 29.—At a mass meeting held here tonight under the auspices of the Mormon Elders now working in the State, President B. E. Rich of the Southern States Mormon mission said he had been opposed to the nomination of Congressman-elect Roberts of Utah, was opposed to his election and he cared not what became of him politically.

New York, Nov. 29.—The Western Union announces that on and after December 1, 1899, its telegraphic messages between Havana, Cuba and New York and all places east of the Mississippi river, including St. Louis and Minneapolis, will be 15 cents per word and that the rate to all other places west of the Mississippi river will be 20 cents per word.
