New York, Nov. 30 .- A dispatch to the World from Havana says: Governor General Brooke was asked by the World correspondent if the Cubans were satisfied with the present government. He said:

"They themselves are best qualified to answer that question. I only hear of their grievances, and spend much of my time in correcting them. "I believe, however, that most of the intelligent people of the island are thor-

oughly satisfied with the form of gov-ernment the United States has given them during the past ten months. I also believe that they are convinced that the United States has a sincere regard for their wishes and means to rester their bids the sector.

"Do you think," was asked, "that it would be advisable for the United States to withdraw the troops now in

the island, or at least a part of them?" "I do not believe that it would be prudent. The presence of the soldiers has a beneficial effect, and although no


