He Declares That the Era of Misunderstanding Between Two Countries Closed.

Berlin, April 1.-The publication in a Munich journal which is issued twice a month of what it claims is a copy of the letter which Emperor William sent to Lord Tweedmouth, first lord of the British admiralty, which created a sensation both in Germany and in England, and a copy of a letter from Lord Tweedmouth in reply, created considerable commotion in Berlin to-day. The foreign office declared that day. The foreign office declared that the letters published were not copies of the originals, and the official news agency pronounced the publication an "April Fool joke."

"April Fool Joke." Despite tness declarations, the im-pression prevails in well informed cir-cles that both copies were authentic. The paper does not explain how the letters came into its possession. As reproduced, the emperor's letter ap-pears quite harmless in character, there being not the slightest attempt in it to influence Gerat Britain's naval policy. It was prompted by a pub-lished letter of Lord Esher, who is a member of the entourage of King Ed-ward, in which he said: "There is not a man in Germany, from the emperor downward, who

Admiral yon Tirpitz is secretary of the German admiralty. "Our sea power," continues the em-peror, "is one-fifth yours, one-fifth, do you know what that means? It means that Germany can never take offensive at sea; only she is not disposed to neg-lect the duty of defense and self-pres-ervation.

Now here are they political; always are they economical. It is the intention of Mrs. Shaw, who is the daughter of the late Louis Agas-siz, to establish self-supporting settle-ment houses in various parts of Bos-ton. She aircady had set aside a trust fund of \$2,000,000 to carry out this pro-ject, and has indicated that this amount will be increased to \$5,000,000.
