RIGHTS OF CITY COUNCILS.

A tocal contemporary has been in the habit of abusing four members of the City Council, because they have not been able to see eye to eye with the mayor on some important public matters. The excuse for this is founded on egregious errors which ought to be expoxed; we do not expect that they will be dissipated from the imaginings of contemporary.

First, the notion is conveyed that as the four gentlemen alluded to were elected by Republicans, they were in duty bound to act in the council as partisans, and to take their cue from their fellow Republicans in that body. Seeond, the fallacy is set forth, that when the mayor makes an appointment they must unhesitatingly concur, or they are to be considered as "hold-ups." "recreants," "betrayers of their party" and "outcasts." Third, that the council in differing with the mayor "Is constant ly socking to usurp executive prerogative and appointment."

In taking the oath required by law on entering upon their official duties, members of the City Council were not placed under any partisan obligations.
