A THOUSAND

Were Never Before Equaled in That Region of Hurricanes-Surviving Inhabitants Left Very Destitute.

San Francisco, Feb. 8 .- News of a fearful loss of life in a destructive storm that swept over the South Sea islands last month reached here today on the steamer Mariposa, direct from Tahiti. The loss of life is estimated at 1,000 souls. On Jan. 13 last a huge tidal wave, accompanied by a terrific hurricane, attacked the Society islands and the Tuamotu group with fearful force, causing death and devastation never before equaled in a land of dreaded storms, a verification of man's inability to contend with wind and sea The storm raged several days reaching its maximum strength between Jan. 14 and Jan. 16. From the meager advices received at Tabiti up o the time of sailing of the Mariposa, is estimated that at least 1,000 of the dand's inhabitants lost their lives. is feared that later advices will add) the long list. The first news of the disaster arrived at Papeete, Tahiti, Jan. 26, on the schooner Eimeo. The captain of the schooner placed the fatalities at 500. The staamer Excelsion arrived at Pa-peete the following day with 400 desti-tute survivors. The captain of the Excelsior estimated the total loss of life at 800. These figures comprised only the desthe on the free sciends of at 800. These figures comprised the deaths on the three islands of Iao, Hikuera and Makokau, whose orinary population is 1,800.

On Hikuera Island, where 1,000 inhab-itants were engaged in pearl diving, nearly one-half were drowned. On an adjacent island 100 more were washed ut to sea. Makokau and Hao are de pulated. Conservative estimates at thit place the number of islands vised by the tidal wave and hurricane at ghty. All of them are under the control of the French governor at Tahili, The surviving inhabitants are left des-titute of food, shelter and clothing, all aving been swept away by the storm. The French government, upon re-selpt of news of the disaster, took prompt measures to relieve the dis-tressed district and dispatched two warships, the Duranee and Zelee, with fresh water and provisions. The Ital-ian man-of-war Calabria accompanied

the two French vessels on their errand of mercy. As the supply of fresh water and provisions was totally exhausted by the storm, it is feared that many es will be lost before the relief ships

Opium Smuggling Ring Found.

San Francisco, Feb. 9 .- The operations of an opium smuggling ring, which is said to have its headquarters in Seattle, have been uncovered in this city, and one of the gang has narrowly escaped arrest. On Feb. 3 the Port-and customs officials notified Collector Stratton that they had seized a trunk full of opium, which had been sent as baggage from Scattle to Valle-to. They gave the number of the trunk check and said that when they selzed the trunk it contained 130 five-tael tins

of opium, valued at about \$1,000. They left one tin of opium in the trunk and sent it to Vallejo. The local customs officials watched the trunk until it was delivered to the room of E. M. Mor-gan in this city. Morgan, who is thought to have been warned, was not on hand to receive the smuggled stuff,

To Reduce Ireland's Representation

New York, Feb. 9.-The government has determined to reduce Ireland's representation in parliament, says Tribune's London correspondent, government's hands will be quite this year with Irish land and London education, and it may be taken for granted that the redistribution scheme to be the chief measure of 1904. the basis of the present population England has 36 members too few, Scotland three too many, and Ireland 33 too many. There are 103 Irish seats in the commons today, and it is an open se cret that the government intends to reduce this number to 85 or less. The vationalists argue that, as the act o union gave Ireland 100 members, the Imperial parliament has no right to re-duce this representation. When the act passed the population of Ireland was 5,000,000, about half that of Great Britain. Today the population is 4,-434,000, or a little more than one-ninth that of Great Britain.

As the Islands were barely 20 feet above sea level, and not surround-ed by coral reefs, it was necessary for all the inhabitants to take to the cocoa-nut trees when the tidal waves began to cover the land. These trees grow to an immense height, many reaching ar altitude of 100 feet. All of the lower trees were covered by raging seas which swept with pitliess force about and over them. The natives in the taller trees were safe until the cocoa-

nut roots began to give way, and then they, too, were swept onward, far out nto the sea. The 400 survivors brought by the Ex.

celsior to Papeete gained the ship's side by swimming three and four miles from the tops of the coacoanut trees. The Eimeo, though badly disabled by the storm, also brought off as many persons as could swim to her sides, she, like the Excelsior, being unable to run close to the shores, because of the fearful violence of the ocean swells, which continued to run abnormally high for a week after the tidal disutrbances.

Another schooner, the Gauloise, from the Marquesas islands, 600 miles from Tahiti, encountered the hurricane while en route to the latter place, and only the timely action of the captain in hav the timely action of the captain in hav-ing the cargo, consisting of 30 head of cattle, 35 pigs 30 tons of cotton, jettisoned, saved the lit-tle craft from destruction. Even with this precaution, the life of one man was lost by waves sweeping the decks. One of the many acts of heroism re-

ported is that of a woman, who elimbed one of the tall cocoanut trees and lashed her little babe to the branches, hanging on to the body of the tree beneath the little one as best she could. There they remained for 10 hours, sufring great torture until finally resned

Thousands of tons of copra and over 200 tons of mother of pearl shells are known to be lost. The pearl shells are valued at \$1,800 per ton, and many valu-able pearls may now be lost to the world forever, as these were considered ome of the best peal islands in the world.
