OUTLAW PIERCE'S WORK.

He Kills Proprietor Kuebelick of Belfast Hall, Buford, N. D.

Butte, Mont., June 22.—A special to the Miner from Buford, N. D., says Proprietor Kuebelick, of the Belfast Hall, was shot in the street this afternoon. It is supposed that outlaw Pierce, who escaped from the Glasgow jail with William Hardee, did the shooting to prevent arrest. Pierce is known to be in the vicinity of Buford and there seems to be little doubt that he was recognized by Kuebelick and shot him to prevent being apprehended. Kuebelick was killed by a 30-30 rifle bullet. A large posse is in pursuit of Pierce.

THE BULL "LAUDIBLER."

Prof. Thatcher of Chicago University Declares It Is Not Genuine.

Chicago, June 22.—The papal bull known as "Laudibler," over which controversies between historians have been waged for some seven centuries, is not genuine, according to the announcement of Prof. Oliver Joseph Thatcher of the University of Chicago. In a paper entitled "Studies Concerning Adrian IV," just issued from the university press.

This conclusion is the result of a trip to Europe, a year's study in the Vatican library, and the reading of innumerable Latin documents. The "Laudibler," so called from the occurrence of the Latin word in the salutation, has long been supposed to be a grant made by Pope Adrian IV, concerning on Henry II, of England the island of Ireland to hold in fief. Concerning its genuineness or falsity historians have long been in dispute.

Prof. Thatcher shows that the question of offering of Ireland to Henry as a fief, and the question of the genuineness of the bull, are not the same. "Laudibler" cannot have been written, says Prof. Thatcher, "by one who knew what was essential to such a document. It is merely a Latin exercise of some twelfth century student, who was practicing the art of composition, and for this purpose those to impersonate Adrian IV. It must be rejected as entirely worthless."

Soie Heir to Many Millions.

Boston, June 22.—George Howard McDonald, a Boston laborer, is said to have been positively identified as the sole heir to \$3,000,000 cash and gold mining claims valued at many times more, left by an uncle, William McDonald, who died recently in California.

Arrested for Kidnapping.

Greenwich, Conn., June 22.—John Maguire, a well known man, has been arrested on a charge that he had kidnapped the daughter of Alexander Young, here a few days ago. The complainant is Mrs. F. Marion McAllister, grandmother of the child in whose care the child was. The troubles of the McAllisters have been in the courts. The couple were recently divorced. The wife married a New York artist.

Conard Line Will Withdraw.

London, June 22.—In spite of rumors circulating here and statements made by the Cunard line officials in New York, no authoritative announcement has yet been made here regarding the withdrawal of the Cunard line from the Atlantic steamship conference. The papers generally accept the report and hold that the action will precipitate a serious war of rates.

Cienfuegos Lightermen on Strike.

Havana, June 22.—The shipping traffic at Cienfuegos is tied up by a strike of lightermen for higher wages. Heavy rains have caused overflows in some sections of the country. The cessation of cane grinding is everywhere complete.

London Matinee Record Receipts.

London, June 22.—Record receipts for Beerborn Tree's performance of "The Man Who Was," for the benefit of Queen Victoria's sanatorium at Davos, Switzerland. A total of \$25,000 was netted.

Julius A. Joergenson to be Deported.

San Francisco, June 22.—On July 19, if the necessary papers shall have arrived, Julius A. Joergenson and his companion, Miss Johanne Mueller, will be ordered deported to Copenhagen, Denmark on a charge of embezzlement. Joergenson stole 40,000 francs from the Bank of Copenhagen and eloped with Johanne, who was a clerk in the same bank. He took with him his two children, a boy of 11 and a girl of 9 years.

Fatal Flashlight Powder Explosion.

Chicago, June 22.—The explosion of 90 pounds of flashlight powder in the basement of a residence at Berwyn, has caused the death of Mrs. Mary Wilson, wrecked the house and created a panic among the children of the Irving school on adjoining property. Mrs. Wilson was working in the basement forming the powder cones ready for a supply house in Chicago. The powder had become caked from dampness and Mrs. Wilson was rubbing it vigorously between her hands to reduce it, and this friction, it is believed, caused the powder to explode.

Louis Ingwersen Dead.

New York, June 22.—Louis Ingwersen, former agent in New York of the German Immigration society and later of the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe and New York Central railroads is dead at his home in Yonkers, aged 56 years. He was one of the founders of the Improved Order of Red Men, and Supreme vice commander of the order.

Teller Howard J. Hill Arrested.

Rutland, Vt., June 22.—Howard J. Hill of Bristol, formerly teller in the Farmer's National Bank of Vergennes, which was wrecked two years ago by Cashier Lewis, has been arrested on a charge of abstracting funds from the bank. Lewis and his clerk are now serving sentences in state prison.

Cruiser Chattanooga to be Sold.

New York, June 22.—A legal advertisement, published in an Elizabeth, N. J., paper, gives notice that the cruiser Chattanooga will be sold by the sheriff within three months for the payment of claims against her, unless these are liquidated. A deputy sheriff, who captured the cruiser a few days ago, is still in command, but work is proceeding.

Baldwin-Ziegler Buoy Picked Up.

Copenhagen, Denmark, June 22. A buoy thrown out by the Baldwin-Ziegler Polar expedition at Franz Josef Land, June 11, 1902, was picked up at Vopna Fiord, far bay on the northeast coast of Iceland May 2 of the present year.

A Comet Discovered.

Cambridge, Mass., June 22.—A telegram has been received at the Harvard college observatory from Prof. Kreutz at Kiel stating that a comet was discovered by Borely at Marselles June 21, 469 G. M. T. in a. r. 21 h. 52 m. 52 s. and dec. 8. deg. 19 m. Neucleus and tail were observed.

Increase in Social Democratic Vote.

Berlin, June 22.—The official returns show that in the general elections the Social Democrats cast 2,299,000 votes, an increase of 509,000 over 1900.

Italian Arrested for Abner's Murder.

New Rochelle, N. Y., June 22.—An Italian has been found at Tuckahoe, who answers the description of the murderer of Special Officer Abner. He is badly battered up, his face showing signs of a severe beating such as that Abner administered to his assailant. He was in such condition that a priest was summoned to the police station.

Mandarin Executed for High Treason.

Victoria, B. C., June 22.—Mail advices received here from South China, tell of the execution of a mandarin at Lint-chow for high treason, he having supplied arms and ammunition to the Kwang Si rebels whom he was sent to subdue. He was in charge of one of three columns sent against the rebels and was reported to be making successful headway, but the rebels only simulated defeat and when he pursued them into their camps he laid down the arms and ammunition. He was executed in consequence.

People Go to Dawson.

Dawson, June 22.—The through steamers and scows which arrived from White Horse during the past week brought about 1,000 people and a large cargo of perishable goods. The price of staples, which have been way up in the air for weeks, dropped immediately. Eggs dropped from \$22 a case to \$12, potatoes from 20 cents a pound to 7 cents, and all other staples in proportion.

A PLYMOUTH ROCK TOUR.

A Movement on Foot to Send it to Principal Cities of the Land.

Plymouth, Mass., June 22.—As a result of the visit of the Liberty Bell to Massachusetts, a movement has been started to send the Plymouth Rock on a tour of the country, to visit all the large cities. The idea has been enthusiastically received by the guardians of the rock in this town and plans are now being formulated to that end.
