Cattle for the Show Ring.

An Experienced Exhibitor Explains His Method of Preparation.

First of all comes selection of the animals for preparation. I have always considered that a most important factor in the whole business if you expect to be successful in the show ring. Always select the best animals you can get. You must have early maturing types with a massive size and plenty of hair, descended from animals of good pedigree, rams for ewes, lambs for ewes, lambs for ewes.

After marking my selection, all cattle above the age of sixteen. I have a hunch that cattle with horns are a little bit more sprightly than those without, and mix them all together. Yearlings I allow twelve quarters each animal daily, increasing to sixteen quarters for older cattle, giving one-half the allotted food night and morning, and, starting at night, two feedings with a little bit of hay.

At the end of the three weeks I staple them during the day, for fear of getting the new coat of hair bleached by the sun, so detrimental at that time of year.

At night I let them have the run of a special pasture, adjacent to the barn, kept for that purpose, containing their food to fourteen quarters, consisting of four quarts oats, with an addition of from 1 pound to 1½ of cracked or oats for each animal daily, to prevent bloat in three feeds—morning, noon and evening, and a full portion for supper at night. The pasture ground is broken up with a corn folder, a very devious invention.

I keep rock salt by them in preference to common salt, the small percentage of saltwater contained therein acting like the kidneys to keep them in working order, and a few drops of oil to assist in a second preparation.

I have a great aversion to all kinds of soap. I never sharpen the feed last, always give it dry; that is, to make a small punch, which gives the animal a much greater hold and adhesion.

I have a special feed for the cattle to drink water out of a pail with one handful of wheat flour added. It corrects all impurities in the different kinds of water you meet with in making a circuit. I compound this way of watering the cattle, and after a few days you will notice the first effects of the fairs. Also, if you want your cattle to thrive keep all feed, hay, staples and stable appliances clean and clean. Most especially one kindness in handling, or you will lose weight.

Grounds for blanketing are two of the most important factors in making a good show in the ring. In the early part of preparation I use a woolen covering with a small portion of McDouglas' sheep dip added to each pail of raw

water and wash the animal thoroughly. It will kill all lice, remove all soot and make a rapid growth of hair. I use this wash every month during the growing season, and I do not want to wash with a soap and water, because it will not do any good.

I commence to wash blankets in July—over this time and light, to keep the flies away. If I want to grow a long silky coat of hair, after first grooming with the brush and before placing the blanket, I wash the entire animal, then spray the animal all over, then wash again with water, afterwards setting the blanket on. If it is a very dry, hot time I spray this same process on twice each day. A smooth coat is not much trouble and more easily prepared, the less hair there is to wash. I have a special wash for never cutting a horse's hair, and a special wash for horses.

I also then Hirsch show cattle can be produced mainly off the products of the fair, the success of the mainland Hirsch in London, and the great success of the American.

I did not care for myself to tell the story of doing the work all alone. First, in selecting the animals I have the aid assistance of C. R. Smith, an eminent expert judge of cattle. Hirsch and in carrying out my own ideas and suggestions, I have the services of Mr. F. J. Johnson, a famous animal breeder.

I also have a special wash for old cattle, giving one-half the allotted food night and morning, and, starting at night, two feedings with a little bit of hay.
