#### RAISULI, DEAD OR ALIVE.

RAISULI, DEAD OR ALIVE. Tangier, July 31.—The government roops, under command of Cald Bouch-ia, renewed operations against the law-ess tribes today. They surprised the village of Alakala, inhabited by Italsuli topporters, at daybreak and set it on bre. A brief right ensued in which many were killed, and a large number of prisoners fell into Bouchta's hands. The commander of the troops offered is big reward to any one delivering to aim Raisuli dead or alive. Raisuli's letter to the sultan's minis-ter threatening to kill Caid MacLean ind an urgent message to Bouchta ac-pualiting him with the threat and ad-ising suspension of hostilities, have so far had no deterent effect on the com-mander of the Morocean troops. It is reported that Raisuli had formu-iated demands indirectly involving the idemand of either destroying the gov-termment's authority or sacrificing Caid MacLean's life. # PANAMA RAILROAD.

Large Part of Track Ten Miles from Colon Sinks Materially.

Colon, July 31 .- The damage to the Colon, July 31.—The damage to the roadbed by the sinking of the land around Lion hill, 10 miles from Colon, is more serious than was reported yes-terday. A portion of the track built over the marsh, which is known as Black swamp, between Ahorca Lagarto and Lion hill, sank within 30 feet of a number of freight trains. Both ends of the isthmus are tied up and passenger trains are irregular, the passengers be-ing transferred by means of temporary pathways. The letter was mailed in New York on the afternoon of July 22, the day that Tavshaujian was shot. It was written in red ink, in the Armenian language and was signed by the sym-bol of the terrorists, three hands with daggors uplifted, poised above a red heart.

The executives of the Constan-tinople Armenian revolutionary ter-rorists' organization condemn to death Haroutian Gubenkenian, Gulabi Gul-benkenian and Patrick Gubenkenian, the three brothers, who entirely have deaf ears to all appeals for national freedom. Our executive board, hav-ing given its decision to Haroutian and Gulabi Gubenkenian in America, gives them 24 hours' time to decide between their duty and death.
