Beginning of "Purple Day" at
The State Fair Grounds

ANTLERED CROWD IS COMING.

ROUTE.

The column will face south on State
and move at the word of command to
Third South on the east side of the
street. Third South to Main on the
south side of the street. Main north to
the Monument on the west side of the
street. Counter-march to Second South
on the east side of Main; Second South
to Main on the north side of the street
and counter-march on Second South
to West Temple on the south side of
the street. First South on the west
side of the street and First South to
State on the north side of the street,
where the column will break rank and
make refreshments at the club.
Every member of the B. P. O. E. in
the city is urgently solicited to turn
out for this parade. There will be a
division to fit any suit an Elk may
appear in and the heartiest sort of a
welcome for any wandering as well as
home stay of the herd.
The line of march will be a little over
a mile long. The column will move at
7:15 sharp. The duration of the parade
will be 27 minutes.

RAISING THE MAINE.

A Tribune Querist Addressed the Wrong
Authority.

The following "question" and "an-
swer" were found in a recent issue of
the Salt Lake Tribune:
Q. On July 10-11, Has the wreck of the
U. S. S. Maine ever been raised from
the harbor of Havana?
A. Do you think the United States
Government has any desire to have the
wreck of the Maine brought to the sur-
face? If not, why not?—W. E. Spohn.
Probably not, because it wouldn't pay
to raise the wreck; the raising would
cost a good deal of money, and what
was raised would be of no value.
The Tribune as usual is incorrect, as
will be shown by the following extract
from Frank G. Carpenter's Havana let-
ter, printed in the Saturday "News"
last week:

during the past few weeks I have had
occasion to pass by the Maine. Only a
small portion of the vessel is still above
water and this is red from the accumu-
lated rust. About a year ago a con-
tract was made with the government
by an American named Dr. Wyckoff to
remove the wreck from the harbor.
The work was to be done at the ex-
pense of the contractor, who was to
pay \$5,000 to Cuba, and in exchange
to be given a title to the property re-

covered. A company with a capital
of \$500,000 was incorporated at Wash-
ington, D. C., last fall to do this work,
and connected with it was Dr. E. L.
Corbitt, the well known engineer, and
others. So far nothing has been done,
but I understand that the contractors
expect to build a water-tight cofferdam
about the vessel and to raise it to the
surface. According to their arrange-
ments with the government, the Maine
is to be entirely removed by next De-
cember.



NEW FOREST DALE MEETING HOUSE.

Built at a Cost of \$24,000, and Which Will Be Dedicated, Debt Free, Tomorrow
Evening.

At Forest Dale tomorrow evening
will be dedicated a place of worship
for members of the Church of Jesus
Christ of Latter-day Saints, which they
have been at work upon for half a cen-
tury. The building is a magnifi-
cent one, and for its purpose of a ward
chapel is perhaps unequalled in the
mountain valleys. For tomorrow
night's service an elaborate program
of song and short speeches has been
prepared. President Joseph F. Smith
will offer the dedicatory prayer. Supt.
George M. Cannon will tell of the way
the finances were raised for the chapel,
and Bishop James Jensen will welcome
the people to the new edifice. A fea-
ture of the construction of the new
church is that the first service will be
held in it debt free, every item of its

BULL KILLED MARE.

Accordingly a Suit for \$100 Damages in
Begun in District Court.

A damage suit in which a ferocious
bull is the principal character was filed
in the civil division of the city court
yesterday by Fred Rasmussen, a mil-
ner, by Rasmussen, his guardian
ad litem, against Rasmus Nielson. The
complaint alleges that defendant is
the owner of the bull and that he neg-
ligently allowed the animal to run at
large through the streets of Granger.
On July 16, it is alleged, the bull vi-
ciously attacked a valuable mare be-
longing to plaintiff and a deadly com-
bat ensued, which resulted in the death
of the mare. Plaintiff has accordingly
been damaged in the sum of \$100, for
which amount he asks judgment.

SLANDER SUIT.

Woman Sues Man Because He Called
Her a Liar and a Thief.

A \$5,000 slander suit has been filed in
the district court by Mrs. Margaret Gio-
rie against Max Daniels. The complaint
alleges that on July 1, 1905, the defend-
ent slandered plaintiff by making the
following charge against her in the pres-
ence of W. R. Hutchinson: "You are a
liar; you are a thief; you have stolen
from me and have cheated me out of my
business." Because of said slanderous
statements plaintiff alleges that she has
been damaged in the sum of \$5,000.

THE COMING OF "POMPEII."

The Big Pain Spectacle to be Seen Here
Next Week.

It has been several years since Salt
Lake City has seen one of Pain's big
midsummer-night spectacles, and the
announcement of the coming of the
most popular and fascinating of them
all—"Last Days of Pompeii"—at Walk-
er's Field, all next week, will be re-
ceived with pleasure by all lovers of
these gorgeous pyrotechnic displays.
The production comes to this city di-
rect from Denver by special train, ar-
riving here early Monday. In the lat-
ter city "Pompeii" has been doing a
phenomenal business, and the news-
papers have been loud in their praise
of the merits and attractiveness of the
gorgeous production. The new "Pom-
peii" will be found to be a very differ-
ent attraction from the one seen here
some years ago, being presented on a
far more gorgeous scale. Twenty car-
loads of massive scenery are utilized
in the scenic representation, and a
portable amphitheater with a seating
capacity of 10,000 people is provided.
This mimic city represents with ideal
accuracy the fated city that perished in
the first century of the Christian era.
The view is said to be marvellously cor-
rect and historically accurate, being
like what the archaeologists now sup-
pose the ancient city was at the time
it was destroyed. The whole effect un-
der the glare of half a hundred arc
lights and calcium is most beautiful.
As one sits in the vast amphitheater
and gazes on the scene before him he
sees the full Vesuvius with its head
rained against the sky; below are the
houses, temples, arches, etc., and so

properly represent these latter many
real structures 20 to 40 feet in height,
are blended in with the "picture" in
the background.

The tragic dramatic episodes of the
spectacle are shown in pantomime. The
scenes are interrupted by the terrific
eruption of Vesuvius and the destruc-
tion of the city by the earthquake,
which is a scene thrilling beyond de-
scription, and brings into action all the
skill and ingenuity of Pain's artists.

COMING AT LAST.

Salt Lake is to Have a New Republican
Paper Within 60 Days.

Salt Lake will have a new daily pa-
per within 60 days. This is the definite
announcement made this morning by a
prominent Republican, who stated fur-
ther that arrangements had been prac-
tically completed with the Publishers'
Press news agency, for a daily service

almost equal to that of the Associated

Press. President J. R. Shale of the Publish-
ers' Press association of New York was
here yesterday and held a conference
with Senator Reed Smoot, Judge H. E.
Henth, State Chairman E. J. Revenue,
Collector Callister, ex-Secretary of
State Hammond, Justices Straup and
McCarthy of the supreme court, and a
number of others prominent in Repub-
lican ranks. While no agreement was
entered into at that time, it is authori-
tatively stated that a proposition was
well received and that a contract will
be drawn up some time next week.

It is understood also that the new
paper has ample financial backing, and
that it will start out with a subscrip-
tion list of at least 3,000. It is claimed
that it will be straight Republican in
politics and will give the news with-
out fear or favor. Republican leaders
feel that the time is ripe for such a
move and that the success of the party
depends largely upon its ability to fight
its own battles. The paper will issue
every morning and, it is said, will be
furnished to subscribers for 50 cents
a month. The editor and manager of
the new paper have not yet been decid-
ed upon.
