NEGRO SOLDIER MAKES CONFESSION

D. C. Gray- Late of Twenty-fifth Infantry, Clears up Brownsville Affray Mystery.

SHOOTING DONE IN REVENCE.

Attack Not Premeditated But Was Done on Spur of the Moment After an Injury.

Galveston, Tex., March 17 .- The mis'stery surrounding the alleged raid of the aegro soldiers from the Twenty-fifth infantry upon the people of Brownsville, Tex., on Aug. 13, last year, has been cleared up, according to a story orinted today by the Galvaton News. After seven months of investigation by federal authorities, what appears to se the true version of the crime has been secured from D. C. Gray, one of the discharged soldiers, who admits dust he partially participated.

The man has been living in Galvesion a large portion of the time since ie was discharged from the army soon after the outrage.

According to his statement, the attack was not premeditated, but was the result of an alleged injury done one of the soldiers by a white man in Brownsville half an hour before the raid. The regro, returning to the barracks, seized ils rifle and announced that he was gong to kill the white man. Several other ng to kill the white man. Several other begro soldiers volunteered to go along and see the work well done, and to wipe at other scores which they had against the citizens on account of the injuries which they claimed to have suffered. The negroes returned to the barracks after committing the assault on the sown, and many soldiers assisted in the hurried claiming of the guns for the inspection which followed soon after the shooting in the town ceased. Suparently the soldiers from only one sompany participated in the raid, al-nough practically the suitre battallon meet the soldiers had done the shoot-mg.
