WEDDER COUNTY FINANCES.

Board of County Commissioners Meet and Transact Business.

Sugar Factory Overcrowded With Bees—See Inspector Reports—A Railroad Man Promoted.

Transfers were ordered made to respective funds from general fund and warrants ordered drawn in favor of State, city, county, and school districts for amounts due.

NO CASH WANTED.

Chairman Adams reported relative to the suggestions of Treasurer Chambers that the board make loans of a portion of funds, in sinking fund. That efforts had already been made to do so and that none of the counties in the State seemed disposed to consider the same.

Quit-claim deed was issued to Ella B. Graves on certain real estate which was sold for taxes in 1898.

Richard Walker had been discharged from hospital on October 1, 1900.

Commissioner Smith also reported that the special road work at North Ogden was progressing favorably.

One hundred dollars was ordered appropriated to E. B. Adams, Commissioner on poor account.

BEE INSPECTOR REPORTS.

C. W. Frost, bee inspector, filed his report showing that he had visited 3,700 swarms of bees during the past summer, and had found out of this number 37 swarms of foul brood in them.

He accounts for this condition existing because of there having been no inspection last year, and means a loss of over 100,000 bees, besides the loss of the encouraging effect it will have on the industry, but with these drawbacks the honey crop will net for the bee owners over \$100,000 this season. He also reported that Utah honey is in great demand.

CONGESTION OF BEETS.

The sugar factory is over-supplied with beets at the present time. The farmers have feared cold weather and have been experiencing would freeze their beets and have rushed their crops in very rapidly, thereby over-stocking the factory. The proprietors have found it necessary to turn beets back to the farmers, but with these drawbacks the honey crop will net for the bee owners over \$100,000 this season. CITY COUNCIL.

City council met last evening and transacted the following business: The claim of W. C. Weaver, receiver, for hydrant rental, the bids for the sale of fire hose and the protests against treating sewer No. 9, each of which had already been laid over from week to week, were again laid over until next meeting.

Miscellaneous claims amounting to \$1,000.00 and \$492.85, were ordered paid.

The committee on laws recommended that C. M. Desjardins, D. L. Lee and Alonzo Rogers, firemen asking for back salary, be granted \$17.50 each and that M. J. Hewitt be granted \$52.50, all in full payment on signing the necessary legal release from further liability on the part of the city. The report was rejected.

On motion of Mr. Powers, Sanitary Inspector J. H. Watkins was granted \$10 per month, beginning with October, for a period of six months for horse and laundry hire.

The committee on taxes recommended that a rebate of \$19.65 be granted A. J. Miller on the tax sales of 91 and 94 on the property in Colorado Place; and that all costs of sale and interest on the property of the Barker orphans be remitted as per petition of Patrick Martin their guardian. Both reports were adopted.

The sexton's report for September, showing twenty-three interments and \$118 for grave digging and sale of lots deposited with the treasurer, was ordered filed.

Representatives of the Utah Federation of Women's Clubs asked the council to instruct the chief of police to enforce the expiring ordinance, referred to the police committee.

Thos. Topham was granted a rebate of \$17.50 on his liquor license, after which the council adjourned for two weeks.

TYPHOID FEVER PREVALENT.

There are a number of cases of typhoid fever in the city, more than have been at one time for the last seven years. Dr. Allen reports that in all the cases that have come under his notice, the patients have used water from ditches or surface wells; he believes this water is infected and has caused the disease. He advises, as a precautionary measure, that all surface water be boiled before drinking, during this season of the year, and believes this would prevent a great deal of sickness.
