## DUKE AND DUCHESS VERAGUA

**CHICAGO, May 2.—** Director General Davis was summoned before the national commission this afternoon to explain why he should not carry out the instructions of the commission regarding the use of planes made by non-exhibitors. This vexing plane question seems to have caused a decided clash of authority between the national commission and the council of administration. Blaine appears determined that the other shall withdraw. Today at a concert given in Music Hall at the fair grounds such a plane was used in violation of the orders emanating from the commission and with consent of the administration.

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If the lines of the Trunk line commission are carried out it will cost \$30. to see the big fair, go through to California and return to New York.

Trouble Over the Reciprocity Treaty with Brazil and Spain.

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The Brazilian government is also making trouble over the reciprocity treaty, the article continues. It was understood that when the revenue of imports and exports of the United States are made the general rule of Brazilian import duties might be raised. Brazilian advantage of this arrangement to raise the dutiable schedules as soon as the reciprocity agreement is signed they would do so.

The result will be a very small net gain to American merchants, while the loss of Brazil are complaining of increased schedules against other countries. Spain and Brazil would probably be wiped out once and for all by the administration to proceed with deliberation.

PUTS HONOR, RES. READY TO FIGHT  
FOR CUBAN LIBERTY.

**THE SPANISH GOVERNMENT TAKES THE  
MATTER UNDER AGREEMENT.**

New York, Fri., May 3.—The Cubans of Key West are still and firm in their enthusiasm. Four hundred men met last night and were addressed by prominent speakers, who called for volunteers. From eighty to one hundred men then stepped out and pledged themselves to fight for Cuban freedom.

It is learned that twenty men now remain April 20th in Havana, in the province of Santiago, led by two Cuban Americans, one a former member of the Cuban legislature, and the other a soldier.

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
