FINE SHOWING FOR CITY SCHOOLS

Only One Expulsion for Truancy
—Attendance of Boys is
Greater Than Every.

SUGAR FROM MOLASSES.

Amalgamated Factories Busy With
Osmose Process—Lecture by Junius
F. Wells—News Briefs.

Ogden, March 5.—According to the figures in the office of the board of education there has been but one expulsion from school on account of truancy. This is the lowest record in the history of the public schools of the county. The work of Probation Officer H. C. Jacobs, in connection with that of the police, has done a great deal toward decreasing the cases of "hookyeying" which were more or less frequent heretofore.

It is also shown that there are less boys working now at jobs which necessitated their staying away from school than at any time in the fall of the year. When school starts there are six hundred boys and girls employed in the various factories and packing plants which prevents their attending school. But this condition does not last longer than December. From early November the attendance of boys in schools has steadily increased until at present it is greater than ever.

OSMOSE SUGAR MAKING.

Ogden, March 5.—Next week promises to be a busy one in the Ogden and Logan, Utah, and La Grange, Oregon, factories of the Amalgamated Sugar Company as well as at the Lewiston, Idaho, Sugar company's plant, in the manufacturing of the beet sugar molasses, or brown sugar into granulated sugar. The process which is one of the most difficult in the factories is accomplished by the Osmose process and requires a great amount of boiling and refining of the product which is not

Made into sugar during the regular
season run of the factory with sugar
beets.

The Osmose process will require several weeks at each of the factories and when the run completed several thousand pounds of granulated sugar will be sacked for the market. At such times no regular employment will be given about town.

After the run is completed all of the factories will be given their annual overhauling and general cleaning and repairing, which in itself requires many men and several weeks time.

At the forthcoming meeting of the directors of the Amalgamated Sugar Company it is expected that the sum of \$100,000 will be authorized upon improvements. The money will be expended in purchasing new machinery and buildings. Each year new inventions are upon the market and these the company installs in all its factories.

At the meeting it is expected that some action will be taken in regard to the La Grande, Oregon, plant, as to whether it will be continued, sold, or removed to some other locality. It has been found that the present amount of acreage can not be secured at that factory.
