AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance amending Section 1. Chapter 50 of the Revised Ordinances of Salt Lake City, 1892, in relation to the erection of telegraph and telephone poles in the streets of Salt Lake City.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah:
Section 1. That Section 1 of Chapter 50 of the Revised Ordinances of Salt Lake City, 1892, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:
Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall erect any telegraph, telephone, electric light, electric railroad or other poles in any of the streets of Salt Lake City, unless such person, firm or corporation shall erect any telegraph, telephone, electric light, electric railroad or other poles in any of the streets of Salt Lake City, unless such person, firm or corporation is the holder of a franchise granting certain specific and privileged uses of sald streets, and then only in strict pursuance of a permit from the City Engineer, which permit must be on the ground during the whole time the work of erecting any such pole of poles is in progress, and must be freely exhibited to any person or city officer asking to examine it provided, that any person, firm or corporation not the holder of such a franchise as is herein referred to, may obtain permission for the erection of specified poles upon application in writing, presented to the City Council.

AN ORDINANCE,

An ordinance levyting a tax and for the assessment of property on the north side of Fourth South street between West Temple and First West streets, in Sidewalk district No. 15, for the construction of a sidewalk.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Sait Lake City, Utah;

Section 1. That the City Council does hereby levy the tax and provide for the assessment upon the property hereinafter described abutting on the north side of Fourth South street between West Temple and First West streets, in sidewalk district No. 15.

This tax is levied to defray the expense of constructing a sidewalk upon said por-
