SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 9.—The President's

message on the inter-oceanic canal

was read and referred.

A communication

from the Secretary of the Navy

relating to the number of paymasters in

the navy, and under what circum-

stances Edward Bellows was drop-

ped from the roll of paymasters, was

referred.

Thurman presented a memorial

of the Indians of the Indian Tribes in

the Indian Territory remonstrating

against the passage of the bill to es-

tablish a United States court in that

Territory. The bill was discussed

about the reference of the bill, it was

not referred.

Bills were introduced by Kernan,

giving all religious denominations

equal rights and privileges in Indian

reservations.

By Edmunds for a Custer monu-

ment in Washington.

Reilly submitted the following

resolution:

Whereas, It has been announced

by the public press, and there is reason

to believe that a contract has

been entered into by and between

the Central Pacific Railroad Com-

pany and the Union Pacific Railroad

Company on the one part, and the

Pacific Mail Steamship Company in

consideration of receiving the sum

of \$110,000 per month from the rail-

way companies binds itself to such

rates for freight and passenger as

may be fixed by the said rail-

ways and to collect the same from

the commercial public; and

Whereas, The effect of such a

contract is directly prejudicial to the

public interest, and contrary to the

purpose that controlled Congress in

chartering the Union Pacific Rail-

road Company and in granting to

both railroad companies large

subsidies in money and lands; there-

fore,

Resolved, That the committee on

judiciary be instructed to investi-

gate and report whether such a con-

tract has been made and what legis-

lation is necessary to prevent the

execution of the same and to pro-

tect the public interest.

Such committee may report a bill

to carry its recommendations into ef-

fect.

The words "and there is reason

to believe" were stricken out of the

motion of Edmunds and the resolu-

tion was agreed to. The calendar

was then taken up.

The Senate took up the Porter

bill. McDonald addressed the Sen-

ate. He said the President had told

Congress that he had no power to

appoint Porter, and there was no

color. He therefore

rightly referred the matter to

Congress, which has unlimited

power over the army and navy. It

does not possess the pardoning

power, but it possesses the power to

obliterate a law imposing disability.

He read a decision to show that a

court martial verdict could be re-

versed. The court

composed of men likely to be in-

terested in the case, Ricketts and

King were commanders in Mc-

Dowell's division. Pope was the

chief prosecutor and witness. Mc-

Donald favorably commented on the

report of the board of review and

referred to the testimony of Conde-

rate general in behalf of Porter.

He will conclude to-morrow. Ad-

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 9.—A bill to estab-

lish a department of agriculture was

referred to the committee of the

whole on the calendar.

Scales, from the Indian committee,

reported a bill authorizing the Pres-

ident to prescribe suitable police regu-

lations for Indian reservations, and

punishment for arson, murder, rape,

and burglary on Indian reservations,

placed on the calendar.

A considerable number of bills

were reported from the same com-

mittee for various local purposes.

Whitcomb, from the naval com-

mittee, reported a bill authorizing

and equipping an Arctic expedition;

referred to the committee of the

whole.

Hester moved to consider the

calendar, being the political assess-

ment bill; agreed to, 116 to 104. He

will call the previous question at 4

p. m. to-morrow.

House advocated the bill.
