SILVER BELL STRIKE.

Recent Disclosures on California Level Look Encouraging.

Look Encouraging. Fred C. Raabe, superintendent of the Süver Bell, started for Salt Lake on company business and took with him some fine spectmens of rock which he uncovered the night before at his prop-erty, says the Park City Record. The rock is very rich looking and assays from it are being awaited with interest. The discovery was made on what is known as the California level of the mine, and was not entirely superpet mine, and was not entirely sunexpect-ed. Mr. Raabe stated to a Record re-porter that the great quantity of sur-face water which has found its way into the mine has made progress some-what slowly, and it is very unpleasant to work in. There is at least 30 feet of water in the winze now, although the water in the winze now, although the worst part of the season is over. Then, too, Mr. Raabe has a very limited force of men at work, so cannot develop as fast as he would like. He is confi-dent, however, that in time he will strike it big and so be repaid for all of his trouble and efforts. He states that in going ahead 60 feet he encountered no less than 20 fissures, all carrying ore of value, and this, he believes, shows positively the presence of a large body nf ore underneath, and that is what is now being sought. NEW COAL FIELD.

Large Vein Discovered Near Red Rock Station in Montana.

A large bed of coal has just been discovered in Beaverhead county, about 10 miles south of Redrock, on the Oreby inters source of the order, on the order gon Short Line, says the Idaho Falls Register. The beds comprise 52,000 acres of what experts call high grade bituminous coal, being partly in Mon-tana and partly in Idaho. Work on this deposit will be commenced at once. New York, June 20 .- The tone of the opening of the stock market today was firm with some advances, except for Metripolitan Street Railway which ran off a point.

Southern Pacific and St. Paul advanced 5. The market was narrow and dull. A further relapse to 110% by Metropolitan Street Rallway, and large realizing in Southern Pacific forced the active stocks back slightly. The advance was resumed later under the leadership of United States Steel preferred, which was bought in large blocks up to 55%. Other favorites sold well above Saturday's close, especialy St. Paul, Southern Pacific, Missouri
