Ogden Junction, Jan. 13—

We learn from Mr. Thayne, of Willard Mercantile Inst., that John Staffor, who was found some days ago at the Warm Springs near Salt Lake City frozen and demented, was taken back to Willard, and his feet were in such a terrible condition that his toes had to be amputated. Dr. Ormsby, Jr., was sent for from Logan to attend to the unfortunate man and performed the operation successfully. Staffor has preserved a stubborn silence since his return and refuses to speak to anybody under any circumstances. It is not expected that he will recover.

Beaver Enterprise, Jan. 9—

We are reliably informed that Col. Woodward, commander of the post at Ft. Cameron, has ordered that the irons be taken off John D. Lee during the day and replaced on again at night. This is very kind on the part of the Col., for which we doubt not the prisoner and his friends will feel very grateful.

William Fotheringham was arrested yesterday and entered into three hundred dollar bonds to appear before Commissioner Wilkins at 10 a.m. to-day. We understand the charge to be committing adultery with his wife. It seems that one Adolphus Rasin alias Abram Levi was married by Elder P. P. Pratt to Miss Mary Wardrobe in 1853, under the name of Abram Levi. In the spring of 1856 he went to the States on mercantile business, and while in St. Louis was charged with improper conduct with a woman by the name of Mrs. Stodwick, for which he was cut off from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, published in a newspaper called the *Mormon*, published in New York by Elder John Taylor. Here the curtain dropped over Levi. He left his wife with a babe six months old and his wife never received a letter or any means of support nor even heard of him until about a year ago. Now we understand he appears under the new name of Adolphus Rasin, claims Mary as his lawful wife, and sues Mr. Fotheringham for adultery, the latter having married the deserted woman and supported her and her children for some, perhaps twelve to fifteen years.

We understand the defendant waived an examination and entered into recognizance in the sum of \$1,500, his wife Mary and son Abram in the sum of \$500 each, to appear at the first term of the Second District Court. Levi, alias Rasin, being unable to procure bonds, was held on his own recognizance in the sum of \$1,000 to appear at the same time; the three last named mentioned as witnesses.
