The Cannon Naturalization Case.

The case of the United States ex rel Allen G. Campbell, plaintiff, vs. George Q. Cannon, defendant, instituted in the Third District Court June 8th, 1881, and involving the citizenship of Hon. George Q. Cannon, came up to day, on the demurrer of the defendant to the complaint. The complaint, after a series of allegations, prays for relief as follows:
 That the Court adjudge and decree that the defendant George Q. Cannon is not a citizen of the United States and never was naturalized according to law.
 That the certificate of pretended naturalization now held by the defendant dated Dec. 7, 1854, be adjudged fraudulent and void and annulled.
 That said George Q. Cannon be enjoined and commanded to desist and refrain from demanding, accepting or receiving from the Treasury of the United States, through its disbursing officer, the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Representatives, or from any other person, the salary and compensation pertaining to the office of Delegate to the 47th Congress for the Territory of Utah, pending this action, and upon hearing perpetually.
 For such other and further relief as the justice of the cause may require, and for costs of this action.
 Subsequent to the filing of the complaint, the defendant, by his attorneys, filed a demurrer to the same embodying the following points:
 That the Court has no jurisdiction of the subject of this action.
 That the plaintiff has no legal capacity to sue the cause of action mentioned in said writ, but the action should be brought in the name of the real party interested, viz: Allen G. Campbell.
 That there is a misjoinder of parties plaintiff in this, that the complaint attempts to unite a cause of action in which the United States alone as a Republic in its own behalf is interested, and one in which Allen G. Campbell is alone interested.
 That several causes of action have been improperly joined, to wit: A cause of action for annulling a certificate of naturalization, with a cause of action for enjoining defendant from exercising the functions of office of Delegate to Congress and receiving pay therefor.
 That the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action.
 The hearing on the demurrer, mainly on the question involved in the last section, commenced about half-past ten this morning, when Arthur Brown, Esq., counsel for the defendant, made a very able argument of an hour and a half's duration. He was followed by Judge J. G. Sutherland, for the plaintiff, who spoke till recess and continued at 2 p.m., and closed about half-past 2 o'clock. Judge McBride, his associate, followed, and was speaking when our reporter left the Court room. Mr. Brown intended to reply at the close of Mr. McBride's remarks.

 Sixteenth Ward.—Patchwork cushion, girl of 13; vase of wool flowers, girls of 8 and 11; map of the United States, boy of 12; woolen stockings, girl of 10.
 Seventeenth Ward.—Pair of worked slippers, girl of 10; vase of wax flowers, girl of 13; jellies, girl of 13.
 Eighteenth Ward.—Pair of child's shoes, first attempt, boy of 14; Swiss Cottage of card and paper, boy of 12; knitted cat, girl of 12; loaf of bread, girl of 10.
 Nineteenth Ward.—Wax water lily, girl of 7; crocheted table mat, girl of 13; cross, covered with hair work, girl of 10; cake, butter and jellies, girl of 10; candy figures, boy of 8; sponge cake, girl of 10.
 Twentieth Ward.—Cake, girl of 7; blanc mange, girl of 6; peanuts on vine, boy of 11; rug by crippled boy, aged 12; wool shawl, girl of 13; girl's dress, girl of 15; vase of wax flowers, girl of 12; painted flowers, girls of 9 and 11; parrot on canvas, girl of 12; butter, girl of 12.
 Twenty-first Ward.—Vases of wool flowers, girls of 10 and 12; child's dress, girl of 12.
 Mill Creek.—Butter, girl of 8; jelly and preserves, girl of 13; girl's dress, girl aged 11.
 Big Cottonwood.—Cake, girl of 10; motto for Primary Association, girl of 12; basket of mixed fruits, also collections of apples and pears, boy of 12.
 Draper.—Box of coconuts, girls of 9 and 13, and other articles.
 West Jordan.—Feather flower, girl of 11, etc., etc.
 Union.—Well knit ball, boy of 7, etc., etc.
 In addition to these, each of the above wards has a nice quilt on exhibition. They were made by children of ages ranging from 5 to 15, and are to be donated to the Temple at the close of the Fair. It must be understood that we have not mentioned half the things that are displayed, nor all of the most prominent ones, but have chosen here and there with a view to suggesting the great variety of the exhibit. Our readers should go and see the Fair for themselves, for it is a thing that must be seen to be duly appreciated.
