Italian Wanted in British Columbia for Dynamiting Hotel Walks Into Jail.

#### THOUGHT IT A LABOR AGENCY.

After Evading Law for Sixteen Months, Fooled Completely by Deputy U. S. Marshal Smyth

Francisco Ciddeo, an Italian who has been a fugitive for a year and a half, walked right into a trap set for him by United States Marshal L. H. Smyth yesterday and will now return to British Columbia to face a murder charge. For a year and a half Ciddeo has manofficer. Continuing to discuss work, times and similar topics, Mr. Smyth steered the Italian east on Second South from the Greek station and when the county jail was reached they turned in: "This is the place," said Smyth, "The work is in the rear but you had better come in and be registered and put on the payroll in the regular way. This is my partner," he added as officer Davitt approached. The three turned into the county jail and entered by a side door. The door was clicked behind Cideo. Something then seemed to tell the wily Italian he had walked into a trap. His eyes narrowed and glanced around quickly. He had been pushed into a chair by Officer Devitt and as he neard Smyth saying. "You are under arrest for the destroying of a hotel and the murder of a girl—etc.," his nerve seem-ed to give way; he started without ex-pression at the bare wall of the jail office. aged to keep just beyond the law's clutch, although there have been times when he got away just in the nick of time. But through British Columbia, Montana, Washington, Oregon, Colora-de and Utah Officer William John De-vitt of British Columbia followed his man, drawing the net closer and closer nround him: never giving up when something went wrong until finally his perseverance conquered and he had his man in custody. The capture was as cleverly planned and executed as any ever made in this city. Ciddeo blew up a hotel in Niagra, B. C. killing Louise King, daughter of the inn keeper. In November, 1906. He made his escape and was followed through various states. Finally he was traced to Salt Lake but, being an Ital-ian, it was no difficult matter for him to keep well under cover. Fellow coun-trymen aided him in this. Officer De-vitt, one of the best in the profession, knew the man was here but as the detective had never seen the fellow, he had to work slowly. He had speci-mens of the foreigner's hand-writing and examined all pay-rolls of the rail-read companies here to find receipts sigued in a similar hand. This was an alias, of course, as was Frank Hosso, but to Devitt it spelled "Cideo," inasmuch as he rec-ognized the writing.

#### CLEVER ARREST.

The still hunt went on. Thursday evening Deputy Marshal Smyth and Officer Devitt stood in the storm wait-ing for their man to come along Sec-ond South street. He failed to show up, and at midnight the officers went home, tired, wet and numb with cold. They were back on west Second South yes-terday morning and at noon saw their man. Mr. Smyth approached the fel-low quietly and asked him if he was looking for work. looking for work am," said the Italian, unsuspect-

ingly. "Well, I have some trench work to be done, and if we can come to terms ed his way to Salt Lake and has been here for several months. He will be taken before Commissioner Baldwin Monday and charged with murder. It is not expected he will fight extradition and as he has confessed it looks dark for the prisoner. In British Columbia. John King, wife and daughter were running a little hotel or travern in Niagara, B. C., in 1906, and a half dozen Italians were staying there. About Nov. 18 Mr. King told the Italians he could not keep them any longer. Later in the day three went to work but Ciddeo and two friends proceeded to get fighting drunk. Mr. King locked the doors of the house and notified the drunken Italians they had to leave. This enraged them more than ever and a few hours later a terrible explosion brought the hotel tumbling down. Mr. King, and wife, were blown through windows, escaping with a few bruises but the daughter was caught beneath a heavy timber. ### POTTER INVESTIGATION.

#### Superitnendent of Grazing o nWyoming Preserves Hears Complaitns.

(Special to the "News.") Cheyenne, Wyo., Jan. 31 .- Dr. A. F. Potter, superintendent of grazing, bureau of forestry, has held several conferences with Seey. Walker of the Wyoming and National Wool Growers' associations relative to complaints of sheepmen regarding grazing in the re-serves. The sheepmen of Weston county, Wyo., claim they have been unable to market their sheep because they were not permitted to trail across the Black Hills forest reserve; that sheep have been excluded from the re-serve because of misrepresentations, etc. Mr. Potter promised to investigate this matter at once and grant the de-sired concessions if conditions are found to be as represented by the sheepmen.
