

SALT LAKE SEES CLEVER CAPTURE

Italian Wanted in British Columbia for Dynamiting Hotel Walks Into Jail.

THOUGHT IT A LABOR AGENCY.

After Evading Law for Sixteen Months, Fooled Completely by Deputy U. S. Marshal Smyth.

Francisco Ciddeo, an Italian who has been a fugitive for a year and a half, walked right into a trap set for him by United States Marshal L. H. Smyth yesterday and will now return to British Columbia to face a murder charge. For a year and a half Ciddeo has managed to keep just beyond the law's clutch, although there have been times when he got away just in the nick of time. But through British Columbia, Montana, Washington, Oregon, Colorado and Utah Officer William John Devitt of British Columbia followed his man, drawing the net closer and closer around him; never giving up when something went wrong until finally his perseverance conquered and he had his man in custody. The capture was as cleverly planned and executed as any ever made in this city.

Ciddeo blew up a hotel in Niagara, B. C., killing Louise King, daughter of the inn keeper, in November, 1906. He had to work slowly. He had specimens of the foreigner's hand-writing and examined all pay-rolls of the railroad companies here to find receipts signed in a similar hand. The Oregon Short Line yard and construction accounts rewarded his infinite care, for on them he found a signature, Pino Bianco. This was an alias, of course, as was Frank Hesse, but to Devitt it spelled "Ciddeo," inasmuch as he recognized the writing.

CLEVER ARREST.
The still hunt went on. Thursday evening Deputy Marshal Smyth and Officer Devitt stood in the storm waiting for their man to come along Second South street. He failed to show up, and at midnight the officers went home, tired, wet and numb with cold. They were back on west Second South yesterday morning and at noon saw their man. Mr. Smyth approached the fellow quietly and asked him if he was looking for work.

"I am," said the Italian, unsuspectingly.

"Well, I have some trench work to be done, and if we can come to terms

you are just the man I want," said the officer.

Continuing to discuss work, times and similar topics, Mr. Smyth steered the Italian east on Second South from the Greek station and when the county jail was reached they turned in. "This is the place," said Smyth. "The work is in the rear but you had better come in and be registered and put on the payroll in the regular way. This is my partner," he added as Officer Devitt approached. The three turned into the county jail and entered by a side door. The door was clicked behind Ciddeo. Something then seemed to tell the wily Italian he had walked into a trap. His eyes narrowed and glances around quickly. He had been pushed into a chair by Officer Devitt and as he heard Smyth saying, "You are under arrest for the destroying of a hotel and the murder of a girl—etc.," his nerve seemed to give way; he started without expression at the bare wall of the jail office.

STORY OF THE CRIME.

The crime for which Ciddeo has been wanted was one of the worst ever known in British Columbia. John King, wife and daughter were running a little hotel or tavern in Niagara, B. C., in 1906, and a half dozen Italians were staying there. About Nov. 18 Mr. King told the Italians he could not keep them any longer. Later in the day three went to work but Ciddeo and two friends proceeded to get fighting drunk. In this they succeeded most thoroughly. Stripped to the waist Ciddeo rushed into the hotel barroom and flashing a stiletto dared any one to attack him. Mr. King locked the doors of the house and notified the drunken Italians they had to leave. This enraged them more than over and a few hours later a terrible explosion brought the hotel tumbling down. Mr. King, and wife, were blown through windows, escaping with a few bruises but the daughter was caught beneath a heavy timber. Tony Lombardo rushed to save her when a second explosion blew him back across the street. When the smoke died down nothing but bits of flesh could be found of the young woman. Ciddeo was suspected and got out of the country in a load of hay. He worked

ed his way to Salt Lake and has been here for several months. He will be taken before Commissioner Baldwin Monday and charged with murder. It is not expected he will fight extradition and as he has confessed it looks dark for the prisoner. Officer Devitt will take the prisoner back, after having followed him for months.

WIFE IS EXONERATED

Autopsy Over Body of Jack Lavery Shows He Died from Complication Of Diseases and Alcoholism.

That J. T. Lavery came to his death not from any other person's treatment but from a complication of diseases, of which delirium tremens was a leading one, is the conclusion of County Physician Calderwood who performed an autopsy on his body as it lay in O'Donnell's undertaking parlors yesterday afternoon.

Lavery has been dead since Monday and while his face was bruised as if he had been badly beaten, the autopsy developed the fact that he was also suffering from pneumonia. Bright's disease and liver complaint, as well as being weakened through general debauchery. The report of the county physician ends the official investigation into the case.

The funeral will be held under the auspices of the Structural Iron Workers and Knights of Pythias tomorrow, and interment will be in Mt. Olivet.

Mrs. Lavery is completely exonerated by the investigation. The fact that she had brought Lavery home Saturday night intoxicated, and that on the way an altercation had ensued, led to an investigation of the cause of death.

SHEEP QUARANTINED

Wyoming Suffers from Importation of Michigan Rams.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Jan. 31.—A serious outbreak of scabies in sheep has been reported to the state board of sheep commissioners from Natrona county where 20 bands of sheep have been placed in quarantine. The outbreak is believed to be due to the importation of diseased bucks from Clarkston, Mich., recently, the said bucks coming in without government inspection. The shipment was dipped once by state

inspectors after arrival at Casper, but this treatment was not sufficient apparently to kill the disease.

Commissioner Delairder of the western district has taken charge of this situation and has appointed a number of inspectors to watch the exposed sheep. As fast as the disease appears in the bands, the said bands are dipped.

The sheepmen have held two meetings at Casper and are very indignant and threaten to sue the party guilty of importing the diseased bucks.

Another outbreak has occurred in the sheep of the Rodney King Sheep company at Moorcroft. These sheep were affected with scabies last September, and were treated in oleum, but broke out with the disease again about Jan. 20.

The recent outbreak of scabies in Converse county is believed to be under control, as no new cases have developed.

POTTER INVESTIGATION.

Superintendent of Grazing a Wyoming Preserves Hears Complaints.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Jan. 31.—Dr. A. F. Potter, superintendent of grazing, bureau of forestry, has held several conferences with Secy. Walker of the Wyoming and National Wool Growers' associations relative to complaints of sheepmen regarding grazing in the reserves. The sheepmen of Weston county claim they have been unable to market their sheep because they were not permitted to trail across the Black Hills forest reserve; that sheep have been excluded from the reserve because of misrepresentation, etc. Mr. Potter promised to investigate this matter at once and grant the desired concessions if conditions are found to be as represented by the sheepmen.

A number of sheepmen living adjacent to reserves who have never been permitted to use the reserves have complained and their cases will be investigated by the forester. Complaints of Angora goat raisers in Texas and elsewhere regarding excessive charges, will also be taken up.
